Eta Generously Supports Early Educator Service Project

Ten York City beginning teachers were recently presented with baskets loaded with supplies ranging from everyday practical items like post-it notes and markers, to little snacks for energy and stamina. Of particular interest was Pam Wible's preparation of bags complete with a card for each, with a clever play on words to encourage the recipients.

Eta chapter members gathered on August 24 at St. Paul United Methodist Church in Manchester to assemble the items that were donated by individual members. There were plenty of items that filled ten baskets to the brim, and were sure to delight and encourage teachers just starting out in education.

Additionally, the gift baskets contained pamphlets informing the recipients about Delta Kappa Gamma and its mission.

As an added feature of the evening, Nicole Braswell, niece of Barbara Heilman, shared her firsthand experiences as a homeschool teacher with us. Through Nicole's presentation, attendees were able to catch a glimpse of the particular challenges, advantages, and successes that a dedicated homeschool parent faces each day. With the obvious positive outcomes that her children have

gained, including college athletic scholarships, athletic opportunities to excel in partnership with her local school district, and broad exposure to a world of learning through membership in peer organizations, Nicole could be a "Poster Mom" for homeschool education.

It was interesting to note that many of the challenges that public school educators face are shared by parents who choose to educate their children at home. State standards must be met, and demonstrated to an independent evaluator in order for the students to be promoted to the next level. There is abundant paperwork that is intended to serve as evidence that individual goals have been set and achieved, and parents must choose from a menu of options for standardized testing. Motivation is another key element in keeping home schooled students actively engaged. Similar to public school students, those who learn at home have "good days and bad days". Nicole stays on top of it with a deep sense of honor for the individual needs and talents of her six children, a consistent routine, and has loved teaching them well! The proof has been in their abundant success.
