Acknowledging Outstanding Women

2. *Incorporate Diverse Voices:* Ensure that your lessons and activities include women from different backgrounds, cultures, and time periods.
3. *Host Guest Speakers:* Invite guest speakers from your community to speak about experiences and expertise.
4. *Curate a collection of books* that highlight the accomplishments of women.
5. Take a *virtual field trip* to the National Women's History Museum.
6. *Dance party* to an all-woman playlist.
7. Share a *new fact every day* about the history of women throughout the world.
8. Who is an *inspirational woman in your life?* Creatively express your feelings to that woman.
9. *Explore art* created by women.
10. *Research inventions* developed by women that revolutionized the world.

Mentoring Moments

1. Encourage adaptability: Teach students to be flexible and open-minded when facing new challenges and changes in the world around them.
2. Foster critical thinking skills: Help students develop the ability to analyze information, think creatively, and make informed decisions.
3. Promote empathy and teamwork: Teach students the importance of understanding and collaborating with others, especially in diverse and rapidly changing environments.
