For your chapter to be able to compete with all of these things, your chapter meetings must be worth the time and effort.

How can we do this? We do this with State

- Rekindle the Passion. Provide a comfortable,
welcoming atmosphere at your meetings. Be sure there
is laughter. Recognize accomplishments and events in
members' lives. Provide good and varied programs.
Some suggestions would include an arts and craft auction near the holidays, book reviews, women's health
issues, chapter projects, or "Go Green" with a program
from an environmentalist and bring your kids along to
the meeting. (This last one is an inspiration from the

Seminar last April.) You know in your heart how to

chapter.

But the Passion! What? How? Use your leadership skills to encourage ACTIVE participation. Getting involved with meaningful programs and activities will rekindle the passion. What your members need to do is to focus on Alpha Alpha State's HOPE project. "O"ffer the gift of membership and "P"romote the passion. Be a cheerleader for your chapter projects and programs. Let them know that we are a philanthropic organization. Tell them the organization has raised more than \$185,000 for the Afghanistan teacher project in collaboration with the U.S. Fund for UNICEF. Alpha Alpha State has raised over \$12,000 for our Ethiopia Reads Project. Let them know about the personal and professional growth opportunities. You've heard it before. Develop your elevator speech, and use it.



Just as members are the "heart" of the Society, programs and opportunities for personal and professional growth comprise the soul that drives The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. And of course, the fuel that drives both programs and opportunities for growth and advancement are the seven Purposes that we all adhere to.

Making sure that the heart and soul of the Society are open and accessible to each member means deliberate planning and evaluating to meet all generational needs. As you begin a new year of chapter meetings consider some of the following in your evaluation of the elements of your chapter programs and your efforts to meet member needs:

- Was there a central theme or subject that promoted the International program theme, the Society Mission Statement and/or the Society Purposes?
- Was the program subject/title pre-announced to the members so member expectations to increase knowledge or gain new experiences were met?
- Was there a coordinated program flow, that is, did it (the inspirational thought, music, and other arts, etc.) all connect?
- Was the presenter(s) knowledgeable in the presentation of the program material?
- Was the program effectively delivered through appropriate presentation methods?
- Was the program of an appropriate length (a big consideration since time is fragile) with other segments of the meeting, such as membership activities, business session, and meal/ refreshments, etc.?
- Were all members able to connect to or be involved with the program either through the relating of personal experiences, preferences, remembrances, hobbies, career anecdotes, or travel (this covers a lot of meeting generational needs)?
- Was there potential for extension of the

- program's thoughts/activities into lifelong learning situations?
- Was there closure or summarization of the program, such as a memento, recognition, a closing thought, a responsive reading, a poem, a picture, a handout or singing of the Delta Kappa Gamma song?

Celebrating the 80th year of the founding of our Society is a time of nostalgia and reflection. The Delta Kappa Gamma Society has been able to flourish and grow through some of the bleakest times in history while other organizations have floundered or dissolved. The reasons can be easily identified—committed members, certainly; outstanding programs, more than likely; capable leaders, no doubt; but probably the key reason that has kept us on the path to prosperity has been an adherence to the Seven Purposes-the fuel that drives the soul of the Society. These purposes are identifiable in our programs, workshops, and seminars. # Advancing the Society Through Personal Growth and Services

# RESEARCH Drives Chapter Decision-Making

Research too often is looked at as a weighty, time-consuming task which interests only a few. However, putting research into the proper perspective, research is a systematic investigation used to collect information on a subject for a specific purpose. Research at the chapter level can be utilized to compile a membership profile, to plan programs that interest every member, and to create program ideas based on members' needs.

Members are the heart of the chapter. It is critical to continually reevaluate ways to rekindle the members' passion for the Society. Addressing purpose six, "to stimulate the personal and professional growth of members and to encourage their participation in appropriate programs of action," is one of the primary ways to retain members and to increase attendance at chapter meetings.

The key words in purpose six are "appropriate programs." Appropriate and relevant programs are the best vehicle to regularly ignite the member's passion for DKG. How does a chapter accomplish this purpose specific to its members? The International Research Committee recommends an efficient process to use to take a snapshot of the needs of its members and then to plan programs to meet those needs. The process, How to Use the Tools to Drive Chapter Decision-Making, involves the following steps:

- Determine research area
- Gather data
- Analyze the data (What does it tell you?)
- Develop an action plan to achieve the goals
- Implement the plan
- Evaluate the action plan and continue this process

Therefore, utilize research to drive chapter decisions in program planning and as a way of addressing membership needs. The Society's International website www.deltakappagamma.net is a wonderful resource for sample surveys as well as a listing of over fifty programs. The Alpha Alpha State Research Committee is available to assist chapters. Committee Chairman Cindy G. Reynolds can be contacted at hodel84@nep.net for assistance. From Vision to Action: Advancing the Society Through The US Forum

#### Mission of The US Forum

The United States Forum seeks to serve the interests of members and reflects the purposes and mission of the Society. Emphasis is on sharing information and ideas that explore solutions to common problems.

#### NATIONAL HEARTBEATS:

REDUCING THE STUDENT TO SCHOOL NURSE RATIO

H.R.2730 seeks to amend the Public Health Service Act to authorize the Secretary of Health and Human Services to make grants to eligible states for the purpose of reducing the student-to-school nurse ratio in public secondary schools, elementary schools, and kindergarten. This bill has been referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce.

### DOUGHNUT HOLE ANNOUNCEMENT

Watch for news on cutting the prescription drug expenses for medicare beneficiaries who fall into the Part D coverage gap, universally known as the doughnut hole. They would only pay 50 percent of the cost of brand-name medications in the gap instead of the 100 percent they must pay now. The new benefit is expected to be part of health care reform legislation that Congress will consider later this fall. If passed, it will likely go into effect in July 2010.

#### FDIC INSURANCE ALERT

Remember that if you have over \$100,000 invested in an FDIC insured institution, the amount over \$100,000 is not covered by FDIC insurance after 12/31/2009.

HEARING AID ASSISTANCE TAX CREDIT ACT
H.R. 1646, S. 1019 Hearing Aid Assistance Tax Credit
Act - Amends the Internal Revenue Code to allow a
nonrefundable income tax credit of up to \$500 for the
purchase of a qualified hearing aid for an individual
who is either: (1) age 55 or older, or (2) is claimed as a
dependent of the taxpayer if the modified adjusted gross
income does not exceed \$200,000.

Comment: Since digital hearing aids cost \$1500-\$2000, a \$500 tax credit is a help, but will not cover it all.

#### COMMONWEALTH HEARTBEATS:

#### KEYSTONE EXAMS COMPROMISE

A compromise between stakeholders has been reached that will give school districts the option to use the Keystone Exam or an approved district exam for all juniors, replacing the eleventh grade PSSA tests. Through discussions, it is agreed that the test will not count for more than 33% of a student's course grade. Most significantly, the Keystone Exams, if selected by a school district, will be graded on a continuum that reflects differences in performance, rather than an all-ornothing, pass-fail basis. #### PROTECTING YOUR PENSION

A combination of factors is resulting in a showdown of what will become of the Pennsylvania Public School Employees' Retirement System (PSERS) in 2012-13. With the economic downturn, the projected increase in state and school district contributions to the pension system, some legislators want to eliminate the defined benefit system with a 401 (k) plan and include a rate hike. Stay informed at www.PSEA.org/pension and be ready to call your legislators to defend the PSERS pension system.


### NOTES from the Rules Committee


