

Goal 1: Growing and Maintaining Membership

State Project: STEM

President Eileen sure piqued our curiosity at this year's state convention when she announced that our next DKG State Project would be **STEM**. For those who are unaware, STEM stands for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics, and is definitely a hot topic in the classroom and in education right now. There are several reasons that STEM is especially valuable to students, and they're not just academic. Students participating in STEM projects develop 21st century learning skills including creativity, collaboration, critical thinking, and communication. Kids also learn that it's okay to fail, viewing it as an opportunity to explore and try new things.

So how do we as DKG members fit into this project? President Eileen's vision for this biennium is that we get involved with STEM in any way that fits our chapters. That could mean collaborating

with a local university and volunteering to help with a STEM workshop day. It could mean providing support to teachers still in the classroom, offering some extra hands to help with projects in their schools. It could be volunteering with your local library to read books to children with a Science theme—and doing an experiment with them. It may even be working with the same Girl Scout troop you connected with during the last biennium, to help them complete some requirements for their STEM related badges and projects! We don't have to be experts in the fields of Science, Technology, Engineering, or Mathematics to participate. Who knows—we may learn some new ideas and practices ourselves!

Notes from the US Forum

am two days removed from the end of the Global Awareness International Conference held in Mashantucket, Connecticut from July 30 to August 1, 2019. If I had to relate the theme of this experience in one word, my word would be <u>ADVOCACY</u>. As a result of my experience at the Conference, this feature article will start where the last one left off, the exhortation to...

"Do Something."

Our registration packet contained the Summer 2019 A Curriculum of Hope for a Peaceful World Newsletter. This organization was founded in 1986 and is a committee of 14 members from northeast Connecticut who are active or retired teachers. Their work is described as follows:

"Our mission is to promote peace education, protect the environment, foster human rights, and celebrate diversity. We work to identify changing local and global needs in pursuit of a more just and equitable world."

Shea at Among the articles in the summer newsletter was the announcement

in mid-June that Canada was joining the global movement to ban single-use plastics by 2021. Single-use plastic straws, grocery bags, cutlery, plates, and stir sticks are among the items facing elimination. According to the report, one garbage truckload of plastic waste enters the ocean every minute. As a side note, a ten-cent per-plastic-bag charge went into effect in Connecticut on the day we left.

US Forum keynote speaker, Megan Clark Torrey, is the CEO of the World Affairs Council Connecticut. Her message was that preparing all students to be globally engaged and globally empowered citizens is necessary for economic success. Connecticut statistics indicate that one in five jobs are connected to markets outside of the United States, 21% of the population speaks a language other than English at home, and 10% of the population was born outside of the US. If you are interested in learning more about the World Affairs Council, there are Pennsylvania chapters in Harrisburg, Greater Reading, Philadelphia, and Pittsburgh.

One of my favorite sessions included three teenagers who described their advocacy work. Their names were not listed in the program so I cannot provide that information; however, one of

these young women was the founder of the National School Walkout. She described how a random comment on social media became part of the national conversation about student safety. Two other young women described starting a school club that has evolved into a liaison organization that helps student activists become connected with organizations that focus on issues about which they are passionate. Among several posted on the wall during the session was this quote from a Holocaust survivor: "Always take a side. Being silent always helps the oppressor, never the victim."

Throughout the Conference, officers of the Conference for Teaching About the United Nations (CTAUN) Executive Board described and provided action steps to take for each of the 17 Sustainable Developmental Goals (SDGs). I learned facts about elephants in captivity, the United States screening process for refugees, and how organizations are assisting these refugees with resettlement. The message was clear. We need to act. Complaining about what we don't like is not enough. To paraphrase the youngest of the presenters:

"Your voice is your superpower.

Be sure to use it."

Communications Corner - Get Connected A Multigenerational Approach

he Pennsylvania State Organization Bylaws, revised June 16, 2019, have been reviewed by the DKG International Constitution Committee and are in full compliance with the *Constitution* and the *International Standing Rules*. This update is to keep your Pennsylvania State Organization current with changes that occur at the international level as the result of convention actions.

Our State is now ready to help your chapter update and revise your Chapter Standing Rules and Bylaws. Strong chapter Standing Rules indicates a strong chapter. Please review your chapter Rules and Bylaws each biennium to be in compliance with International and PA State Rules.

On the International website there is an updated version of the *go-to guide* of the Chapter Rules Checklist. This checklist will tell you what you need to include in your chapter rules. Click on the Resource tab and a drop down menu will appear.

Click on **GO TO GUIDE**. Open the guide and turn to page 29 - 30, Appendix B. This is what chapters need to include in their chapter rules.

Two PA State chapters have already complied with the new state rules. Thank you.

Speaking Professional, a founding member of the Association of Transformational Leaders, and cofounder of Group to TEAM Leadership Solutions) conducted an interactive leadership bootcamp where we learned that leadership:

- 1. starts RIGHT HERE, RIGHT NOW
- 2. begins with getting intentional
- 3. is not done from our comfort zones
- 4. resides in our relationship with power (whether power over I make the decisions or power with a team makes the decisions)
- 5. is conducted from the 'seat' we are in
- 6. thrives in growth mindset environments
- 7. is not a title (we need to give ourselves permission to lead)
- 8. is forward focused
- 9. evokes confidence
- 10. generates team (which is the optimal operating system).

Dr. Judith Merz (Editor of the Delta Kappa Gamma Bulletin, project consultant to the 2018-2020 Administrative Board, and advisor to doctoral students in the educational leadership program at Nova Southeastern University) challenged us to *Find the* "I" in Leader by focusing on integrity (which includes defining our key values) and identity (which includes our learning/operational style). She opened our eyes to the Japanese concept of 'kaizen' which means change for good and embodies the notion of continuous improvement (DKG forward moving ever...). And, she emphasized that leadership should be: fun, conscientiously done, a creative process that inspires movement, and something we embody (instead of a title or a role).

DKG Executive Director Nita Scott reminded us that old ways won't open new doors and that we need to welcome the dreams and visions of our members. She stressed that leadership is about taking the reins, building relationships and making connections, and empowerment.

Rounding out the keynote speakers was DKG President, Cathy Daugherty. She emphasized that it

is our responsibility to grow leaders and we do that by:

- 1. confronting the reality of the situation
- 2. identifying future leaders today
- 3. training now for the future through teamwork and collaboration
- 4. educating future leaders about the society
- 5. modeling good leadership.

Workshops and takeaway sessions were equally stimulating. The selection of workshops within the six sessions was so strong that it was difficult to choose just one! Workshops spanned a variety of leadership topics, including transformational strategies; mentorship; leadership concepts; positive change; leadership in meetings; elevator speeches; and, leadership visions for the chapter, state, and international levels. One faced the same dilemma with the two groups of takeaway sessions. Ten-minute takeaway sessions provide tips on time management, use of social media, making connections, member benefits, and more. The six workshops I attended were: Building and Leading a Positive Learning Culture, Leadership for Change; Becoming an Authentic Leader: The DKG Key Women Educator; Our AMAZING Constitution and ISR; Lenses of Leadership: Using Different Perspectives to Reach Our Potential; and Transformation of Change. A nice diversity of sessions filled with ideas to help strengthen our chapter's work.

Not only did this conference stimulate professional growth, but it also offered many opportunities for personal growth, whether it was networking with sisters from Canada, the 37 states represented, and the District of Columbia or learning about Iowa, not only from the 79 Iowans who were there but also from the Taste of Iowa experience. Iowa is #1 in pork production and the Rice Krispy Treat was developed by Iowan Mildred Ghrist Day.

International Conference on July 30-Aug. 1, 2019. Follow along with my adventures and the experiences of my DKG friends.

The Mashantucket Pequot Museum and

Research Center was our first stop at the conference. The non-profit center offered a glimpse into the culture and society of the Pequot Tribal Nation since dating back to the 1200's. Our guide, a Pe-

quot native led us through a maze of pictures, videos and village dwellings depicting everyday life on the land in eastern Connecticut. We were treated to a native tasting for lunch: salmon and corn chowder with corn bread, beef, bison, and venison sobaheg (stew) and bread pudding for dessert. The Pequot hunted and cultivated the land to keep alive their identity as an independent people even after the massacre at Mystic Fort in 1637 by the British. The Tribal Pequots are known as the "Fox People".

The next adventure was the **First General Session - Global Awareness - Women Making A Difference.** The presentation of the flags and warm welcome to Connecticut by Kathleen Lozinak, CT State President set the stage for a peek at the wonderful conference ahead. Highlights of the Session were: The DKG@UN Representatives presenting the first 2 of 17 Sustainable Development Goals (Now referred as SDGs) to the membership. SDG 1: No Poverty SDG 2: Zero Hunger.

Storyteller Donna Dufresne portrayed

Prudence Crandall, a teacher, activist and Connecticut State Heroine. As a Quaker abolitionist and teacher, Prudence Crandall bravely defied prevailing patterns of racial discrimination. In 1832, Crandall admitted Sarah Harris to school, an African American



woman from a successful family, who sought to become a teacher. Local white parents were outraged, urging Crandall to expel Harris. She refused. When white parents withdrew their children, Crandall transformed her boarding school into one for African American girls. In 1833 Prudence opened one of the first schools for African American girls in Connecticut.

Connecticut Night followed with the everyone

enjoying the experience of the **Flamingo Big Band,** a 14 piece all female band who played music of many



eras. A great time was had by all!!

Our next adventure was the session on **Global Awareness - Human Rights.** I was not prepared for this experience! The DKG@UN Representatives presented the next 3 of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs): Good Health and Well Being; Quality Education; and Gender Equality. But what came next was very special.

Marion Blumenthal Lazan, (2nd from right) inducted as an honorary international DKG member.



She presented a phenomenal and emotional, personal account of her experiences and survival as a child. Along with her family, she was held prisoner for 61/2 years in concentration camps during the holocaust of WWII. Her message of respect, tolerance, acceptance, perseverance and hope inspired and touched the hearts of all. The Red Van Sisters were amazed by her resilience and agreed it was the <u>highlight of</u> the conference!

My adventures continued with workshops and takeaways focusing on global awareness, one of which dealt with the DKG Educational Foundation. DKG helps to provide quality education for vulnerable children by building schools and providing access to water and sanitation facilities. One such school is in Ghana, West Africa, which was under construction for several years. The end result is a Preparatory School which is also used by the entire community. Children no longer have to walk great distances to attend school and by the photos shown to us, it was evident they were thrilled to have a school to call their own. Through the dedication and commitment of DKG sisters, schools in Africa are becoming a reality. (see Van page 16)


