GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY FUND ESTABLISHED

DR. EULA LEE CARTER, past state president of Texas, and a member of the International Committee on Expansion, inspired all Delta Kappa Gammas in Seattle with her motion that Delta Kappa Gamma establish a Golden Anniversary Fund.

Declaring that we must plan ahead, Dr. Carter said that it wasn't raining when Noah built the ark. She quoted George Bernard Shaw who said, "Some people see things as they are and say, 'Why?', but I see things as they might be and say 'Why not?' "

It was then announced that Dr. Carter had already sent a check for \$1,000 to headquarters in a gift of faith and love to begin the Golden Anniversary Fund. Dr. Eula Lee presented her gift in honor of Past Presidents of Delta Kappa Gamma, both National and International and in honor of Phebe Emmons, present International President.

The convention proposed that each Delta Kappa Gamma member, wherever she lives, plan to make an individual contribution of \$5.00 to the Golden Anniversary Fund. It was suggested that we might want to give a dollar a year for the next five years, or ten cents a week for the next five years. All such gifts shall be made through the state treasurer.

IOTA

A special news release from International Headquarters announced that the second runner-up for the 1974 Educator's Award was an Iota member. Following is the write-up as given by the international secretary . .

Bernard, Jessie, The Sociology of Community. Scott, Foresman & Co.,

c1973 paperback 216 pp.

Dr. Jessie Bernard, Pennsylvania State University, was the 1966 Educator Award winner, and her 1973 Sociology of Community is a runner-up for the annual award. In her Sociology of Community, Dr. Bernard traces the history of the paradigms of community in sociological inquiry. She recognizes that the known paradigms are lacking not only for the purposes of prediction and control but also seemingly unable to interpret the circumstances of specific communities as we know them. Ms. Bernard suggests that we are conceivably on the threshold of a scientific revolution which will usher a new era of social research, the components of which are already at hand New paradigms will make sense out of the seeming anomalies and will become the bases for a spurt of research through which social scientists will begin to experience success in dealing with the problems of cities. Time is running out. As Dr. Bernard expressed the urgency, "Urban decision making in the public sector is the major unsolved problem in today's society."

MISS MARIE GEORGE was given the Freedoms Foundation Award at a ceremony at Valley Forge, Penn-sylvania. The presentation was given by the foundation president, General

Harold K. Johnson.

The foundation's top honor, the George Washington medal has been awarded to motion picture star, John Wayne, for his long play recording of "America, Why I love Her". Recipients are selected by an independent awards jury, consisting of 13 state supreme court justices and 29 national representatives of civic, educational, patriotic and veterans organizations.

Marie is a teacher in the english department of the Phillipsburg-Osceola Area High School. The award is presented annually to recognize the constructive educational work in building intellectually capable, sound, patriotic young morally Americans.

Alpha Alpha State congratulates all these fine awardees.

MRS. ESTHER GRANDER of Nu chapter recently received a Freedom Foundations Award. She received a Valley Forge Teachers' Medal for her "notable patriotic contributions to youth" and received a plaque speaking of her personal integrity and her furtherance of classroom activities promoting appreciation of country. The award was based upon her school, church, and community activities.

OMICRON

THE LATE DR. MARGARET A. NEUBER, distinguished educator, one of the founders of Alpha Alpha State, and a member of Omicron Chapter, has been honored by her chapter of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society with the publication of SEE, a book containing the ideas originally developed by Dr. Neuber for use in the pre-school program, Supplementary Education Experience. First instituted in Williamsport, Pennsylvania, at the Covenant-Central Presbyterian Church, the program was soon used in other centers in Williamsport with Dr. Neuber serving as consultant.

The book is divided into three sections: Communication Concepts and Skills, Number Concepts and Skills; Social Concepts and Skills. Dr. Neuber's philosophy is presented in each section together with suggested concepts and skills which are needed in the child's world today and suggestions, experiences, and activities for developing such concepts and skills. In each section, stress is laid upon the interaction among child, school, home,

and community.

SEE was published by Omicron Chapter in November, 1972, and was printed and bound by Omicron members in the school office of the Williamsport Area School district. Dr. June E. Baskin served as editor. Photographs in the book are of the children Dr. Neuber worked with in SEE, and the photo-litho pages were made by the graphic arts students at the Williamsport Area Community College. The original manuscript of this memorial book was presented for publication to the Delta Kappa Gamma Society by Dr. Neuber's close friend, Miss Audrey Linaberry. Copies have been distributed to members of Omicron Chapter and to schools in a two-county area; they are available to other organizations that may find it a useful addition to their professional libraries.

Dr. Neuber's largeness of spirit and her dedication to humanity are everywhere evident in this publication which was designed to serve the needs of children."
