

The Conference began officially on Wednesday evening, August 6, with West Virginia Night and Reception. Activities included the recognition of Jean Gray, International President, a musical presentation by "Imagine That" consisting of Maria Busick and Patti Greeneltch on guitar and dulcimer, and the keynote speaker, Homer H. Hickam, Jr., author of *Rocket Boys*, which later became the movie, "October Sky." He spoke about the continuing influence and impact of his elementary school teachers in the Coalwood, West Virginia area. An enjoyable evening was had by all. The first general session was held on Thursday morning. Two highlights included hearing Dr. Belle Wheelan, Virginia Secretary of

Education speak, and learning "The Rhododendron Song", West Virginia's "unofficial" state song. Workshop sessions were held later in the morning, followed by a panel discussion, "Education Now and in the Future" as well as meetings of the Canadian and United States Forums. mpowerment for Excellence is the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International Program Theme for 2002-2006. The Program Resource Guide details that the original concept defining this theme is "providing knowledge, skills, experiences, expertise, preparation and confidence both for us and for other educators." Underlying all empowerment is a basic belief in chapter members and making possible the utilization of the knowledge, experience, strength and capability that these Key Women Educators already possess. Planning meaningful and successful Chapter Programs takes more than just individual effort - it takes empowerment and teamwork! While successful empowerment of Committee Chairmen within the Program of Work structure and working together as a team to plan programs can be rewarding in itself, teamwork should focus on meeting the professional and social needs of all chapter members.

The Program Theme, Empowerment for Excellence, allows Program of Work teams to choose almost any topic that will meet the needs and interests of their chapter members. A TIME TO GROW

he Expansion Committee will work toward birth and growth during the 2003-2005 biennium. Alpha Alpha State Chapters are encouraged to volunteer their time and energy to sponsor new chapters. To assist chapters in planning and discussing how to organize a new chapter, I have included the following guidelines:

GUIDELINES FOR ORGANIZING A NEW CHAPTER 1. WAYS TO ORGANIZE A NEW CHAPTER

- a. In every chapter there are members who know women teachers who should be invited to become Delta Kappa Gamma members. Try to get a list of seven or eight people or more.
- b. You can find prospective members by meeting with superintendents or principals. Tell them about Delta Kappa Gamma and ask them to recommend their best teachers (top 10%)
- c. Prospective members can be found in Vo-Tech Schools, Parochial Schools, Academies, Private Schools, Pre-Schools and Intermediate Units.
- d. Ask your retired members to help by volunteering as aides in adjoining school districts. As they get to know the teachers, they can recruit new members.

2. SPONSORING A NEW CHAPTER

- a. Invite three or four members to become charter members of the new chapter.
- b. If chapter members do not want to leave their chapter, ask them to meet with the new chapter for at least a year and then return.
- c. It is very important to have mentors for the new chapter members!
- d. Some of the costs of organizing a new chapter will be paid by Alpha Alpha State. Please keep a record of all expenses.

3. INVITATIONS

- a. Invite prospective members to a meeting or a tea.
- b. Introduce Delta Kappa Gamma by giving each prospective member an Alpha Alpha State Brochure. Point out the advantages of being a member: professional growth, personal growth, scholarships, enrichment grants and Act 48 credits.
- c. KEEP YOUR PRESENTATION POSITIVE AND SIMPLE.
- d. Invite them to become part of $\Delta K\Gamma$, explain the fees that are involved, discuss the initiation date which will be scheduled according to the availability of the state president.

4. INITIATION

- a. The state president will conduct the initiation ceremony for the new chapter.
- b. The sponsoring chapter will host the initiation.
- c. The Expansion Committee will assist the group in making plans.

FELLOWSHIPS

hat exactly is World Fellowships, anyway, you may ask, and why should I care about it? As a matter of fact, I asked those questions myself, not all that long ago. And I can answer both of them.

Question #1: What is WF? The World Fellowships Committee is a unique committee in several ways. This committee relates directly to # five of The Seven Purposes of the Society: To endow scholarships to aid outstanding women educators in pursuing graduate study and to grant fellowships to women educators from other countries. The World Fellowships committee, which began in 1949, has given over two million dollars in scholarships to 555 women from 101 countries so they can pursue graduate studies in the United States and Canada. The recipients then go back to their home countries to improve their lives and the lives of their countrymen and women.

Another way that the World Fellowships Committee is unique is that the funds for the scholarships are collected only from donations. There is no money allotted by Delta Kappa Gamma International for this committee. That means it is up to all of us, as chapters and individuals, to give as much as we can to this worthy cause. How can this be done? Many chapters budget an amount to donate to World Fellowships. Many chapters hold auctions or raffles to raise money. Some just take monthly donations from members. And, sadly, some don't do anything. If your chapter doesn't have a World Fellowships chairman, I challenge someone to step up and volunteer to do something to help these amazing women, and then encourage your chapter to budget an amount for next year.

Question # 2: Why should I care? You would only have to meet one of these women to understand why we should all care. In order to qualify for a Delta Kappa Gamma scholarship, first the women must be Fulbright Scholars. They are the cream of their countries' women, who have beaten the odds just to get where they are now. They have left their husbands and children far away to pursue a dream to make a better world for all of us. And, if the world is a better place for us, think what it will be for our children and theirs.

At the present time we are fortunate to have four women studying at Penn State University and one at Pitt. You will find their names at the end of this article. What can you do to make their lives better? Send cards, care packages, phone cards, stationery, or stamps. Let these women know how proud we are of them and that we support their efforts.

We, in Alpha Alpha State, are especially blessed to have the Delta Kappa Gamma International World Fellowships Committee Chairman, Dr. Lyn Schmid, as one of our very own sisters. Dr. Schmid has served on the International WF Committee,

News From NE Regional-Greenbrier, WV August 7, 2003

he US Forum session was led by Georgia Hoskins, NE Regional Representative to the US Forum (IL). The speaker for the event was Kay Goodwin, who serves on the Governor's Policy Board of West Virginia and is the Secretary of Education and the Arts. She presented her perspective on the following important issues in education:

1. No Child Left Behind

This is a complex law that needs to be fully funded to have it be successful. Ms. Goodwin sees the law as a major path to vouchers and charter schools. We need to remember that success stories happen every day in education as the result of dedicated, committed teachers.

2. Teacher Preparation

We need to build a bridge between teacher education schools and provide more clinical experience for the college student. Improvement will come by using data to improve teaching methods. Teaching is a profession and teachers are professionals.

3. Arts in Education

The arts are an integral part of a child's education and valuable in the growth of an individual. The arts should be interrelated and provide the student with the joy and creativity of self expression.


