NERC - US Forum News

he United States Forum convened at the Northeast Regional Conference (NERC) in Windsor, Ontario, Canada on Thursday July 13, 2017. The US Forum advocates for change to meet the needs of women, children, and education. Attendees, at the US Forum in Windsor, voted on the advocacy issues that will be the focus of the March 18-21, 2018 National Legislative Seminar in Washington, D.C. A motion was carried to

voice support of the Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW), an international treaty adopted in 1979 by the United Nations General Assembly. One hundred eighty-nine of the 194 member countries have ratified this treaty. The United States is not among them.

Keynote Speaker, Shelley Gilbert, Coordinator of Social Work Services, WEFIGHT CANADA, discussed how Legal

Assistance of Windsor, (LAW). at the University of Windsor, On-

tario, uses community based advocacy to address human trafficking and women's needs. This clinic involves students from the School of Social Work and Faculty of Law to handle the range of needs facing persons who are recovering from being trafficked. Among the components of the program are: Direct

Afterwards, the United States Forum and the Canada Forum held meetings on their specific agendas. The US Form advocates for changes to meet the needs of women, children and ed-

ucation and focused on the advocacy issues which will be a part of the National Legislative Seminar to be held in Washington, DC, March 18-21, 2018. The Canadian Forum provides an opportunity for the challenge of geographical expansiveness of the Canadian members to share faceto-face educational issues impacting their communities and to network ideas

During the DKG World Luncheon on Thursday, the highlight for Pennsylvania was the announcement and presentation of the **International Achievement Award for 2017** to our own **Dr.**

Lyn Schmid. Her challenge to everyone was to "pick something you are passionate about and give your all." This certainly is a reflection of her per-

sonal dedication to DKG.

The Educator's Book Award was also presented to **Patricia A. Edwards** for her book New Ways to Engage Parent: Strategies and

Teachers and Leaders, K-12. Examples of her

included "if they do

included "if they don't give you a seat at the table, bring a folding chair," and, "if your dreams don't scare you, they are not big enough." From the Beginning to "Forward Moving Ever" It's all about Rules, By-Laws, and our Constitution.

reating the structure, procedures, and purposes of our Society began months before that notable date of May 11, 1929. Through letter after letter and meeting after meeting the ideas for the governance of the Society gradually evolved. Still, on that evening of May 11th, our constitution was only in draft form. Much more had to be decided. Ideas exploring Purpose, Membership, Finance, and Organization needed to be considered. Governance is not an easy process. Realizing that time may reveal inconsistencies and defects as governance took hold, our founders decided that the Constitution they were developing would be on a trial basis of 1 year. And so it was.

One year later, at the National Convention of 1930, the governing document of the Society was discussed and revised. Indeed our founders recognized that for this Society to continue to evolve, changes needed to be made to continue to move forward.

Fast forward to today. Procedures change, ideas soar, and the routines and procedures of how we conduct our chapter meetings today may not be in sync with chapter rules of years gone by. If changes are made, chapter rules should be updated and be indicative of what is currently being done. If your rules have changed please contact the Rules Committee so we can make sure that all changes are in compliance with our constitution. An updated copy

of your chapter rules will also be filed at the State Level.

Since this is the last year of the chapter presidents' biennium, it is a good time to check chapter rules to see if the chapter is doing what is stated. If other practices have been added or some procedures done away with, the rules should be reflex these changes. Besides looking at chapter rules, it is also important to follow up during even numbered years to check if anything has changed in the International Constitution and/or Standing Rules.

Our founders set in motion our beginning. It's up to us, through updating our Chapter Rules, State By-Laws, and Constitution, to keep us.....

services to persons who are trafficked; Development of effective community strategies for prevention, identification, and treatment; Education and awareness building in service providers and the general public; and, System advocacy with provincial and national partners.

A trafficker uses another person to make money, as a source of cheap or free labor, to elevate their personal status, or to assume the risk of criminal activity. Ms.

Gilbert described the three elements that are present in trafficking: Exploitation through labor, marriage, or sex; Recruitment which takes advantage of poverty, lack of options, substance use, desires for the possibility of a new life or to escape abuse; and, coercion through violence, threats, work permits that are tied to a specific employer, and constant monitoring. Sadly, many persons who suffer these exploitations do not see themselves as victims and may

resist the assistance offered because they feel they were complicit in what happened to them.

The list of what survivors need is extensive and includes the following: support; trustworthy people; specialized services; art therapy; healing; a new purpose; counseling; and, a safe place. Tamas Miko, who was quoted throughout Ms. Gilbert's presentation, has a book due out later this year, which details his journey through recovery from being trafficked.

World Fellowship Connecting & Communicating

ith a mission to promote professional and personal growth of women educators, the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International grants world fellowships in accordance with the Constitution and Standing Rules, when sufficient funds are available, to recipients who apply for study in the United States and Canada.

Applications are organized through bi-national selection committees sponsored by Fulbright Commissions/Foundations or by the Cultural Affairs Office of the United States Embassy in the applicant's home country.

The student portion of the Fulbright Program is administered by the Institute of International Education (IIE) in the United States. All documents are sent to IIE, a private, non-profit organization, that helps students with enrollment, visas, insurance and transportation. IIE also aids students with obtaining grants to supplement the Fulbright stipend from many different foundations and organizations, such as the Delta Kappa Gamma World Fellowship Program.

The IIE staff annually reviews successful international candidates and forwards applications for those who meet the criteria for Delta Kappa Gamma fellowships. The World Fellowship Committee selects recipients from the pool of successful candidates for DKG Society grants. World Fellowship students work toward a Master's or PhD degree at approved universities in either the United States or Canada.

The goals of the DKG World Fellowship committee for 2017-2019 biennium include increasing communication with chapters and state organizations by promoting awareness of World Fellowship and the World Fellowship recipients; publicizing the committee's actions; sharing information about World Fellowship through various communication channels; and increasing communication and making connections with the individual World Fellowships recipients.

To aid with communication, the World Fellowship Recipient booklet is published in mid-October of each year. It is published in the fall of the

year because DKG Society International needs to confirm that all award recipients have definitely arrived at their university in the United States or Canada to begin the academic semester. To access the booklet, visit dkgorg, choose the World Fellowship page and scroll down to documents in order to find a link to the booklet. It includes a list of the recipients and their schools. For confidentiality reasons, specific addresses cannot be listed on the website. Addresses are sent to each state organization world fellowship chair.

Bequests and contributions, which are tax-deductible, determine the number of awards given each year. Contributions to the World Fellowship Fund may be made using **Form 43** or with the online contributions form. Both can be accessed on dkg.org under the tab Forms, and Contribution. Fundraising ideas for chapters include raffles, auctions, sales, events, activities and the option to donate when dues are being collected.

The following ideas are suggestions for connecting with World Fellowship recipients. During chapter meetings, send welcoming, holiday, birthday, or thinking of you cards. Invite a recipient to a meeting, a chapter function, or to the home of a member. Take the recipient out to eat or for drives to acquaint her with her new community. Send gift or care packages. Email on a monthly basis. If the recipient lives too far from your chapter area, use Skype so she can attend a meeting. Donate needed items for dorm rooms. Bring a meal. Invite the recipient to attend a state, regional, or international conference and help with cost of travel, room, or registration fees.

Communications encourage connections, which make World Fellowship recipients feel welcomed and encouraged to succeed in their studies. DKG members can impact education worldwide by reaching out to World Fellowship recipients who are leading women educators that will take what they learn back to their countries of origin, impacting communities the world over.

he goals for the Alpha Alpha Communications and Publicity Committee are:

- 1. **S** Strengthen communication among members of state committees, chapters, states, and Delta Kappa Gamma International
- 2. **H** Help chapters in creating newsletters and/or websites to promote the Society
- 3. Increase the visibility of the Society by providing members with a quarterly newsletter
- 4. **P** Provide acknowledgement to chapters who provide a means of communication to their members via a Newsletter and/or website at the

Alpha Alpha State Convention.

5. Seek chapters who are looking for a way to develop and enhance their chapter communication.

Communication is a way that all Delta Kappa Gamma chapter members feel involved and informed. One of the best ways to maintain communication within your chapter is to publish newsletter on a regular basis. The efforts of publishing a chapter newsletter can be rewarded with increased member involvement and commitment. It is suggested to publish a newsletter at least 3-4 times per year.

The chapter newsletters can be emailed, sent by regular mail service, hand delivered and/or posted on your chapter website. All chapter members should receive a copy. Also send a copy via email to the Alpha Alpha State President and the Alpha Alpha State Communications Chair.

Random Reflections of Charlottesville, Virginia by Karen Matis, Alpha Sigma

A step back in time is what Monticello, Highland-Ash Lawn, and Montpelier provide. A small glance showing how founding fathers Jefferson, Monroe, and Madison lived. These estates. now historical landmarks, helped me imagine the tireless efforts that went into the many doctrines researched, contemplated, and drafted that today represent the fundamentals of our great American Democracy. My trip to Charlottesville, Virginia, also allowed me to see the antithesis of the entitled. . .the enslaved.

Functioning more like small communities rather than single households, it's clear to see that these three Presidents strongly relied on women, whether a spouse, daughters, and/or slaves, to maintain an "orderly" household. Sur-

prisingly when Jefferson and Madison died, they left a legacy of debt to survivors. Property, furnishings, and slaves were sold to pay down obligations. Successful efforts of historians, however, have managed to preserve the properties as well as relocate original furnishings.

Excavating continues on Mulberry Row and at Montpelier. Speaking to the head archeologist at Montpelier, I learned that while looking to uncover the location of a stone fence, buttons, bits of pottery, and other trinkets are being uncovered, much to the delight of the student volunteers assisting. What surprised me about Monticello was the attention Jefferson paid to utilitarianism. Having stayed at Nottoway Plantation in Louisiana a few years ago, my illusions of a grand and elaborate staircase, the type Scarlett O'Hara descended to see Rhett Butler.

were shattered. Staircases at Monticello are steep, narrow, tucked away, and function simply to get to a different level of the house.

Jefferson admitted, "Architecture is my delight," and this is clearly evident at both Monticello and the University of Virginia where he designed the first buildings for the college, which include the landmark rotunda. If you go to downtown Charlottesville, the free trolley will take you on a tour of the campus.

My three day trip to Charlottesville included a visit to one winery and two CiderWorks. Sitting at the top of Carter Mountain with hundreds of others, I watched the sunset, listened to local talent, and enjoyed a refreshing wine slushie while soaking up the past, enjoying the present, and contemplating the future.
