US Forum/Educational Legislation Chair

First of all, I'd like to thank Sue Fritz for her time spent as US Forum Chair and for helping with my transition into the position. I was on the US Forum Facebook page and noticed that one of the speakers at the San Antonio Convention was on human trafficking. Although I did not hear this particular speaker, I have been involved in an anti-human trafficking coalition for about ten years.

Human trafficking is defined as **the use of force, fraud**

or coercion to compel a person into commercial sex acts or labor against his/her will. One exception is inducing a minor into commercial sex. It is considered Human Trafficking regardless of the presence of force, fraud, or coercion. Twenty-seven million people are trafficked worldwide each year. Pennsylvania has ranked fourth nationwide in cases, making it to the state's federal courts and in convictions. PA is considered a pass-through state,

with traffickers utilizing our many highways to deliver people to their destination, selling them along the way many times.

The average age of a child being trafficked is 14. It is important that educators know the signs of trafficking and where to go for help. One of the best sources for information is the Polaris Project, www.polarisproject.org. Since 2002, Polaris has assisted victims and survivors through the National


the activity feed, or by posting comments on social media. A different way to connect, but the excitement and passion for DKG still came through loud and clear.

Human Trafficking Hotline, 1-888-373-3777. Polaris has many resources to use in the classroom.

Students should also be educated so they do not have the "It can't happen to me," attitude. There are many resources available for educators to access. When I was in the classroom and would do a presentation on Human Trafficking the students had all seen the movie "Taken" which depicts the kidnapping of a girl and subsequent trafficking of her.

Although kidnapping does occur, the majority of minors are not kidnapped into trafficking, rather they are groomed by the trafficker and most believe that the trafficker "loves" them.

Educators play a key role in combatting Human Trafficking. By knowing the signs, knowing where to go for help in your area, and educating our youth we can help to stop this horrific crime.

- ~ Work collaboratively and involve all members throughout the process.
- ~ Develop a SMART plan of action addressing the chapters' ★ (stars) and challenges.
- ~ Mentor new members.



STEM/STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math)

Jade Leung, Alpha Xi Projects Chair



STEM/STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math) has taken on a new role during the pandemic! Join me on my

STEM adventure! My name is **Jade Leung** (Alpha Xi), and I am taking on the role of Projects Chair, focusing on STEM. I am excited to pro-



vide opportunities and examples of how DKG can be a part of the STEM revolution in school while being mindful of the pandemic.

I teach at a large suburban high school north of the city of Pittsburgh (Shaler Area High School). Last year I was a part of a wonderful example of STEM in the classroom. A new elective course was piloted at my school for upperclassmen called *Sustainability*. It was part of a college in high school course through the University of Pittsburgh. The teacher, Abbey Nilson, who piloted the course asked me to be a part of her field trip as a chaperone, and it gave me the idea for my first *Keystonian* story!

Girty's
Woods is a
155-acre nature preserve that is
part of Reserve Township, a
suburb near
the city of



Pittsburgh. It is part of the school district where I teach. Students in the Sustainability course became part of an effort to help raise funds and awareness for the Allegheny Land Trust to purchase Girty's Woods to keep it as a nature preserve. It includes 3 miles of trails and was once used for logging. In 2020, the "Save Girty's Woods" campaign began with community organizers and the involvement of the Allegheny Land Trust. Through the help of many people, funds were raised to help Allegheny Land Trust take over the land and establish it as a nature preserve for public use.

Throughout the year students in the *sustainability* course learned about the park and the steps involved in establishing it as a nature preserve. Midway through the school year, students got the rest of the school involved and organized a fundraiser where students, faculty, and staff could



donate a small amount of money to sponsor a tree. Donors received a **certificate** of thanks (designed by the students) that listed the type of tree that they sponsored. The students grew the trees in school, and at home due to the pandemic. in April the trees were ready to be planted.

I was invited to be a part of the field trip to Girty's Woods to help plant the trees. Members of the Allegheny Land Trust met us at the park, and students learned more about the nature preserve and the types of plants and animals that are found in the park. After the introduction, we spent the day planting the trees throughout the park. After the trees were planted, students also painted rocks to mark the donated trees. It was a wonderful example of STEM/STEAM during the pandemic. Students learned about the intricacies with establishing nature preserves and how to properly plant trees. Throughout the school year they also learned about the different types of trees and their life cycles and were able to see the completion of the project by planting the trees. They spent the day enjoying nature and even relaxed on the trails of the park and painted the rocks before placing them in front of the donated trees. Over 60 trees were planted in just a few hours!

When I think of DKG I know this is an opportunity for all chapters to become involved in STEM/STEAM. Pennsylvania has beautiful parks throughout our state. I bet there is at least one park within every chapter that could use a little love! Contact your local area school or argil Scout troop in the neighborhood. There are many ways to get involved besides the example that I provided in this article. Perhaps there is a community clean-up day, or a Girl

Some suggested guidelines for a professional chapter newsletter is described below.


Each issue of a Chapter newsletter should include:

- ~ The Society Name
- ~ The Society Mission Statement
- ~ Chapter and State Organization Name
- ~ Volume and Issue Number
- ~ Date

At least three (3) of the following important features:

- ~ Any chapter honors or awards
- ~ Brief summary of the last meeting
- ~ President's message
- ~ Legislative update
- ~ Reminder of important dates and deadlines
- ~ Articles about current chapter projects
- ~ State happenings
- ~ Chapter member's news and or achievements

The newsletters can be emailed, sent by regular mail, hand delivered and also posted on your chapter website. Please make sure to get copy to our State President, our Webmaster and the State Communications Chair in order to receive recognition at the State Convention.

In Case You're Wondering... Kathy Lauer, Beta Beta

As years go by and committees pass information hand-to-hand, items are easily lost or misplaced.
Once such lost item

was a specific job description of what the Historical Records Committee for DKGPA's actual duties are. This year, at President Eileen's behest, a new "job list" has been established and approved. I thought I would share these duties and specific tasks with you.

*To gather records of the current biennium for the State Archives at Paterno Library, State College

Specific Task – Collect Keystonians and other documents as they are given to the Committee.

*To forward all DKGPA records to the Paterno Library's Special Collections Archives

Specific Task – Prior to Convention, create and AEON account at Paterno Library. After Convention, take materials to Paterno Library for archiving.

*To be gatekeeper of valuable Society information

Specific Task — if you are asked to locate something from the Paterno Library, sign onto your account or visit the library to locate the information requested.

*To make archival information available for display at the State Convention

Specific Task –Display on trifold boards or other displays, pictures of Past State Presidents, information about the duties of the Historical Records Committee, other information that you want to disseminate to the membership.

*To assist chapters in the handling of their historical records (as a resource)

Specific Task – Give ideas to chapters as to how to digitize or cull unwieldy amounts of materials collected.

*To prepare an official record of the State President's biennium

Specific Task – During the President's biennium, collect photos of chapter visits, administrative meetings, conventions, and conferences. Create a "scrapbook" of these events. Submit the scrapbook to the President or Paterno Library (if digital) for archiving.

*To write articles, when appropriate, for *The Keystonian*

Specific Task – Once or twice a year, write an article asking for materials from chapter visits to be forwarded to you for scrapbook creation, or write an article about the job of the Historical Records Committee on how to deal with information collected by a chapter Historical Records Committee.

*To present workshops at State Convention as it relates to Historical Records

Specific Task – Work with another committee member to present a workshop at Convention to explain what Historical Records Committee jobs are, how to maintain information, etc.

*To complete activities requested by the State President

Specific Task – The State President may ask our committee to retrieve materials from Paterno Library for Convention or create something (such as a display for Convention) or locate other material from the archives. For example: we were asked to locate the names of all Album of Distinction recipients in 2019.

*To write an annual report regarding the goals and focus of the committee

Specific Task – Prior to Convention or Administrative Board Meetings, prepare a report of the activities the Committee has been involved with and goals wanted to complete for the biennium.

Alpha Beta

Ongoing Jabulani School Project

"Who would have thought?" That is the question my husband and I ask each other when we have been privileged to travel to a place that we never imagined possible. When I realize what Delta Kappa Gamma has been able to accomplish for impoverished children in a rural area of Zimbabwe, Africa, at a school called Jabulani, I have asked that same question. I am astounded!

This journey started in 2014 when I received an PA State Enrichment Grant to help defray the cost of our trip to South Africa and Zimbabwe. Delta Kappa Gamma's "Schools for Africa" project was intriguing, and as part of our journey, we planned to learn about education in these areas. While there, we talked to parents, teachers, and students about their education, and we volunteered at a preschool and at an after-school program. This was Delta Kappa Gamma in action.

While visiting Victoria Falls, Zimbabwe, we talked with our guide, Harrison Muronga, about the benefit of education. At one point, Harrison said, "Education is the basic necessity for any society to move forward!" We were impressed by his integrity, and as we talked, it was clear that he deeply valued learning.

Upon our return home, we remained in contact with Harrison via email and asked what we could do to help improve education for the children. He explained that parents in the area had asked teachers to create a local school so that their children didn't have to walk long distances through dangerous areas to get to a government school. A primary building had been built; ho-

wever, they needed a building for the secondary students. The cost would be about \$30,000. About that time, an article in the *DKG News* con-

veyed information regarding grants offered by the Delta Kappa Gamma Educational Foundation. Over the next two years, I applied for, and received, a total of \$20,000 in grant money from the foundation. The funding was

wired to Sefiwe Ndhlovu, the school founder and principal, and it was used to build the foundation, walls, and roofing for the building. Again, this was Delta Kappa Gamma in action.



Additional money was needed to complete the school. Over the past years, my local chapter, Alpha Beta, and individual members have contributed over \$6,000 to this project. Funding was also provided by additional state chapters: Alpha Phi, Alpha Rho, Delta, and Beta Beta. Windows and doors were added to the building. Painting was completed. Harrison faithfully sent pictures of each step during the building process. The building opened, and classes were held. Again, this was Delta Kappa Gamma in action.

The Covid pandemic has been devastating to the community of Victoria Falls because local income is dependent on tourism. In addition, continued drought has decimated the crops that the rural communities rely upon. Hunger has become a major concern, and of course, this affects the schools and its students. To alleviate this crisis, the government asked schools to provide 2 daily meals for the students. Harrison explained that \$80 provides one meal a day for a month for the 120 students and staff at Jabulani School. So, once again, my local chapter, Alpha Beta, and a nearby chapter, Alpha Phi, have decided to wire funds that are used to provide meals for the children. Yes, this again has been Delta Kappa Gamma in action.

My experience with Delta Kappa Gamma has shown me that the possibilities are endless. While in Zimbabwe, a safari bush guide named Nkosi told us, "Education is the way to improve a country." Delta Kappa Gamma is improving a country, and you are part of that amazing effort!




Beta Pi
