Professor Henry Albinski. The seminar will be introduced by a broad overview of United States policies and interests in Asia in the wake of events following the war in Vietnam. Recent trends and problem areas will be analyzed, in addition to projections into the future.

Dr. Albinski is Professor of Political Science and Director of the Australian Studies Center at The Pennsylvania State University. He received his Ph. D. from the University of Minnesota, and specializes in Pacific politics and foreign relations, with particular emphasis on Australia and New Zealand. A foremost authority in the field, his numerous publications include numerous books and articles. The founder of the Australian Studies Center, he recently organized a major conference at Penn State which attracted visitors and participants from numerous countries, including both scholars and eminent diplomatic representatives.

#### "The United States and the Developing World"

Professor Stanley Kochanek. This presentation will focus on the evolving problem and policy areas of the developing world, and of their relevance to United States in the decade of the 1980s. The dilemmas facing US leaders and policy makers will be presented and analyzed.

Dr. Kochanek is Professor of Political Science at The Pennsylvania State University of Pennsylvania. His interests focus on international relations and the politics of Asian political systems. He has published widely, including major works on the politics of both India and Pakistan. He has recently returned from a year of further study and research in India, and has received such awards as the Fulbright-Hayes Senior Research Fellowship and





# Four Panelists Present Their Viewpoints Re Effects of Nuclear Power on Living

"The Effects of the Nuclear Arms Race and Nuclear Power on Quality Living and Education" was the crucial issue discussed at a recent program presented by Alpha Eta Chapter.

Four panelists made presentations reflecting their differing expertise and viewpoints: Dr. Luther Burse, member of the NEA Executive Committee and the NEA Board of Directors, and immediate past interim president of Cheyney State College; Ms. Roberta Kankus, nuclear engineer in the Generation Division-Nuclear of the Philadelphia Electric Company; Mr. Joseph Lehman, Public Affairs adviser of the United States Arms Control and Disarmament Agency; and Dr. Philip Pollner, specialist in internal medicine and a representative of Physicians for Social Responsibility.

A film, "The Last Epidemic," and a question-and-answer period supplemented the panel presentations to an audience that included members of the community and students at West Chester State College as well as chapter members. Dr. Shirley Walters, first vice-president of Alpha Eta Chapter, served as moderator of the panel discussion.

# Membership Committee Must Screen And Evaluate

The Handbook of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International states "The membership committee at the chapter level should complete the screening and evaluate the professional qualification of the person recommended for membership." This does not permit the presentation of a form 11 to the chairman at a meeting and her presenting the candidate to the membership at that meeting. The membership committee must screen and evaluate.

Some one who was not elected when her name was first presented may be recommended again. She should have neither priority nor handicap on a second vote.

Some one who resigned may seek reinstatement. This means that the chapter needs to examine the situation carefully. If the person seeking reinstatement had belonged to another chapter, contact should be made with that chapter and Headquarters. If all is clear, she may be reinstated upon a 4/5 vote of the chapter. She is not initiated again; she pays a \$9.00 fee. (The Handbook says \$15, but this is an error)

The 1982 International Convention voted to drop "unprofessional conduct" as a reason for termination of membership. Not only is such a charge difficult to define and/or prove, but Americans have become very litigious.

The other reasons for termination remain and must be enforced. Every member should be informed and reminded of requirements and rules. The membership committee should review the excuses furnished for each meeting and keep in touch with the members who begin to miss meetings and seem to have no valid excuse. Problems can be detected earlier.

# PROPOSED BYLAWS OF ALPHA ALPHA STATE OF

SOCIETY INTERNATIONAL

# THE DELTA KAPPA GAMMA

The Bylaws Committee presents, in accordance with Article V, Section C of the CONSTITUTION, the proposed bylaws which will be submitted to the 1983 State Convention in Harrisburg. Proposed bylaws require a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the convention for adoption. If adopted, the bylaws will become effective July 1, 1983.

#### ARTICLE I - NAME

Section 1. The name of this state organization shall be Alpha Alpha State
Pennsylvania of The Delta Kappa
Gamma Society International (hereafter referred to as Alpha Alpha State).

Section 2. Each chapter in Alpha Alpha State shall be designated by a Greek letter or a combination of Greek letters.

#### ARTICLE II - OBJECT

The object of Alpha Alpha State shall be to:

1. promote the purposes of The Delta
Kappa Gamma Society International
as found in the CONSTITUTION,
ARTICLE II.

act as liaison between chapters and the International organization

provide leadership training for state and chapter leaders

 organize Delta Kappa Gamma chapters within the state

#### ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership of Alpha Alpha State shall be composed of active, reserve, and honorary members of chapters within the state. All membership is in accordance with the CONSTITUTION, ARTICLE III.

Section 2. Chapters in the state shall have full power to act in matters of chapter membership.

#### Section 3. State honorary members

A. State honorary members shall be recommended by the state Membership Committee and elected by the Executive Board. A four-fifths (4/5) vote of approval is required.

B. Initiation of state honorary members may be held at state convention or at a meeting designated by the state Membership Committee. The state president shall make the arrangements for the orientation and initiation.

Section 4. The record of all the terminations of membership shall be kept by the state treasurer. The chapter membership chairman shall keep the chapter record of membership terminations.

Section 5. The chapter chairman of the Membership Committee shall notify the state treasurer when a former member is reinstated.

#### ARTICLE IV - FINANCES

#### Section 1. Annual dues

A. The state annual dues shall be determined by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the membership in attendance at the state convention.

B. Annual dues and scholarship fee shall be paid between July 1 and October 31 of each year. On November 1, members shall be dropped for nonpayment of dues and fees.

C. All dues and fees shall be collected by the chapter treasurer. State and international dues and fees shall be forwarded to the state treasurer.

#### Section 2. Financial controls

A. A budget shall be adopted annually by the Executive Board.

B. All expense vouchers shall be signed by the state president; in the event the president is incapacitated, the voucher shall be signed by the chairman of the state Finance Committee before payment is made by the treasurer.

C. The auditor shall be selected by the state Finance Committee for the purpose of auditing the annual financial report.

D. The report of the annual audit shall be submitted to the Executive Board for adoption.

#### ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION

#### Section 1. Chapters

A. Each chapter shall govern the conduct of its business in a manner consistent with the CONSTITU-TION and Alpha Alpha State By-

B. The chapter officers, except the treasurer, shall be elected in evennumbered years by a majority vote.

(1) The term of each elected officer shall be two years. No officer, except the treasurer, may serve in the same office longer than two terms in succession. All officers shall take office on July 1 following their election.

(2) The treasurer shall be selected by the Executive Board each biennium. C. The chapter president shall represent the chapter as a voting member of the state Executive Board.

#### Section 2. New chapters

A. The state Expansion Committee shall be appointed by the state president to work with the establishment of new chapters.

#### ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS AND RELATED PERSONNEL

Section 1. The state officers shall be a president, a first vice-president, a second vice-president, a recording secretary, a corresponding secretary (all elected); a treasurer (appointed by the Executive Board); and a parliamentarian appointed by the president.

#### Section 2. Duties of officers

These officers shall perform the duties as prescribed in the CONSTITUTION, ARTICLE VI and as authorized by Alpha Alpha State Bylaws. Some other duties may be deemed necessary.

#### A. President

B. First vict-president

In addition to the duties prescribed in the CONSTITUTION, ARTICLE VI, the first vice-president shall serve as chairman of the Program Committee.

C. Second vice-president

In addition to the duties prescribed in the CONSTITUTION, ARTICLE VI, the second vice-president shall serve as chairman of the Membership Committee.

- D. Recording secretary
- E. Corresponding secretary
- F. Treasurer

In addition to the duties prescribed in the CONSTITUTION, ARTICLE VI, the treasurer shall keep the official membership record of the state.

G. Parliamentarian

#### Section 3. Term of office

- A. Officers elected by the state convention in odd-numbered years shall have a term of two (2) years, unless otherwise specified, or until a successor has been named.
- B. No officer, except the treasurer, may serve in the same office longer than two terms in succession.
- C. All officers shall take office on July 1 following their election.
- D. The treasurer shall be recommended by the Personnel Committee and approved by vote of the Executive Board.

#### Section 4. Vacancies

- A. When a vacancy occurs in the office of president, the first vice-president shall become president.
- B. When a vacancy occurs in other elective or appointive positions, the president shall name a successor.

#### Section 5. Nominations and election

- A. Nominations for office shall be made by the state Nominations Committee elected at the convention in odd-numbered years.
- B. Election shall be by ballot and a majority of votes cast elects. If there is but one nominee for an office, the election may be by voice vote.
- C. The Nominations Committee shall prepare the ballot and conduct the election.

#### ARTICLE VII - MEETINGS

#### Section 1. Convention

- A. Business of the state shall be conducted annually at a convention held at a time and place as determined by the Executive Committee, for the purpose of receiving reports and adopting policy, amending bylaws, electing officers, and conducting other business which may properly come before it.
- B. Every member who is registered may vote. A roll call vote as specified in the CONSTITUTION, ARTICLE XI, C, 6. may be ordered.
- C. The quorum shall be a majority of those members who have registered at the convention.

#### Section 2. Other meetings

Area conferences and/or workshops shall be held at least once a year for the purpose of leadership training and dissemination of Society information. The time and area shall be determined by the Executive Committee.

Section 3. A quorum for chapter meetings shall be determined by the chapter.

#### ARTICLE VIII - EXECUTIVE BOARD

#### Section 1. State Executive Board

- A. The members of the Executive Board shall be the elected officers, the state founders, the state past presidents, and the chapter presidents. The treasurer and the parliamentarian shall be ex officio members, without vote.
- B. The duties of the Executive Board shall be as specified in ARTICLE VII, Section B. 2. of the CONSTI-TUTION.
- C. Meetings of the Executive Board shall be held at least once a year. Special meetings may be called by the president.

- The presence of a majority of the voting members of the Board constitutes a quorum at meetings.
- (2) Chapter presidents who are unable to attend the state Executive Board meeting may appoint an official representative who shall have full privileges of participation.
- D. A vote by mail is authorized when necessary.
- E. The members of the Executive Committee shall be the elected officers and the immediate past president. The parliamentarian and the treasurer shall be ex officio members, without vote. The Executive Committee shall meet at least once a year between meetings of the Executive Board to conduct business delegated to it by the Board and to take action on matters requiring immediate decision.

Section 2. Chapter Executive Boards shall function in accordance with ARTICLE VII, Section C. of the CONSTITUTION.

#### ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

Section 1. Standing committees shall be:

Expansion Leadership Development Finance Membership Nominations Rules Program Personal Growth and Services Professional Affairs Research Communications Scholarships World Fellowship Historical Records Seminar Scholarship Shop

#### Section 2. General procedures

- A. All committees shall be appointed by the president except Nominations and Finance.
- B. The president shall be an ex officio member of all committees except the Nominations Committee.
- C. Matters requiring immediate committee action may be voted upon by mail, all members being notified.
- D. Committee meetings shall be held with the approval of the president.

#### Section 3. Duties of committees

#### A. Expansion

The Expansion Committee shall establish new chapters in areas of the state.

#### B. Leadership

The Leadership Committee shall consist of three members and shall be chaired by a past president appointed by the president. The committee shall plan and implement leadership programs for state and chapter officers and committee chairmen.

#### C. Finance

The Finance Committee shall consist of five members elected by the state Executive Board for a four-year term with the president and treasurer as ex-officio members. Three members shall be elected one biennium; two members shall be elected the following biennium, et cetera. The chairman shall be named from among the elected members by the president.

The Finance Committee shall:

- prepare the budget and present it for review, modification, and adoption by the state Executive Board.
- (2) supervise all expenditures from the permanent fund
- (3) supervise all investments of the funds
- (4) provide for an annual audit
- (5) perform other duties determined by the Executive Board

#### D. Membership

The Membership Committee shall:

- send to chapter chairmen all instructions and pertinent information pertaining to membership
- (2) screen candidates for the selection of state honorary members
- (3) perform other duties determined by the Executive Board

#### E. Nominations

The Nominations Committee shall consist of seven members. The immediate past president shall serve as chairman for a two-year term. Three members shall be elected by the Executive Board each biennium for a four-year term.

The Nominations Committee shall:

- communicate with chapter nominations chairmen
- (2) solicit recommendations for officers from chapters and individual members
- (3) present to the state organization in odd numbered years a slate of one candidate for each elective state office and prepare the ballot for election
- (4) send a biographical sketch and photo of each candidate to the state editor for inclusion in the Keystonian
- (5) submit to the International Nominations Committee in even numbered years any recommendations for elected international offices or committees

#### F. Rules

The Rules Committee shall:

- (1) review the bylaws and policies
- (2) screen and present recommendations to the membership at the convention in odd-numbered years

#### G. Program

The Program Committee shall consist of a chairman, the chairman of Personal Growth and Services, the chairman of Professional Affairs, the chairman of Research, and a music representative.

The Program Committee shall:

- promote within the state an appropriate Program of Work that covers a wide spectrum of activities which follow the yearly theme adopted by the International Society
- (2) coordinate the Program of Work committees and the music representative

#### H. Personal Growth and Services

The committee shall support and promote the international programs and projects relating to personal growth of members and service to others.

#### I. Professional Affairs

The Professional Affairs Committee shall:

- implement the plans of the international committee and develop such related programs as the state may authorize
- (2) initiate action in the field of legislation to improve education and the status of women educators

#### J. Research

The Research Committee shall:

- (1) conduct appropriate research
- (2) publicize studies of the Society and other research pertinent to education and women

#### K. Communications

The Communications Committee shall:

- promote the use of the publications of the Society and be responsible for publications authorized by the Executive Board
- (2) advise and assist the editor of the KEYSTONIAN and other publications authorized by the Executive Board

#### L. Scholarships

The Scholarships Committee shall:

- (1) encourage members to apply for international scholarships
- (2) promote interest in and support for scholarships and award scholarships for graduate study
- (3) provide other financial assistance to members for study

#### M. World Fellowships

- assist in promoting the work of the international World Fellowships Committee
- (2) communicate with any recipient who is studying in the state

#### N. Historical Records

The committee shall maintain the historical records of the state organization.

#### O. Seminar

The Seminar Committee shall implement plans for the enrichment seminar after approval by the Executive Board.

#### P. Scholarship Shop

The Scholarship Shop shall generate additional income for the Scholarship Fund.

#### Section 4. Special committees

- A. Special committees shall be appointed by the president.
- B. After submitting the final report to the body that authorized it, the special committee shall be dissolved.

#### ARTICLE X - ACTIVITIES

#### Section 1. Scholarships

- A. The number of scholarships and the amount of each shall be recommended by the Scholarships Committee and adopted by the members in convention. A flexible scholarship plan shall be adopted for at least a five-year period.
- B. Rules governing the administration of the scholarship program shall be recommended by the Scholarships Committee and adopted by the Executive Board.

#### Section 2. Publications

- A. KEYSTONIAN shall be published four times each year and distributed to all members.
- B. Special publications shall be approved by the president and plans submitted to the Executive Board for financial approval.

#### Section 3. Special funds

#### A. Serendipity Fund

- A Serendipity Fund shall be established to aid members in an emergency.
- (2) Disbursements from the Serendipity Fund must have the approval of the Executive Board

#### Section 4. Special awards

#### ARTICLE XI - PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER NEW-LY REVISED (CURRENT EDITION) shall govern the proceedings of Alpha Alpha State and its chapters in all cases not provided for in the CONSTITUTION, State Bylaws, and Standing Rules.

### ARTICLE XII - AMENDMENTS

- Section 1. These bylaws may be amended at the state convention in odd-numbered years by a two-thirds (2/3) vote, provided that notice of proposed amendments shall have been published to the members at least sixty (60) days before convening the convention.
- Section 2. Proposed amendments to the bylaws may be submitted in writing before November 1 in even-numbered years to the Rules Committee by any individual member or group in the Society.
- Section 3. The Rules Committee shall present amendments with its recommendations to the convention in oddnumbered years.
- Section 4. Policies and procedures may be amended or rescinded at any annual convention by a two-thirds (2/3) vote.
