The award, first presented to Anna Belle Hamilton in 1979, is given in odd-numbered years to a member who has given distinguished and outstanding service to Pennsylvania State Organization and has promoted the purposes and policies of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International.

As a member of Delta Kappa Gamma since 1990, Kay's participation at all levels of our organization is exemplary. As a member of Pi chapter, Kay has held all chapter offices throughout the years as well as many committee chairmanships. Within her chapter she received the Pi Chapter Achievement Award in 2010. She is a mentor to new initiates and continues to encourage fellow officers.

At the State level, Kay was President for the 2013-2015 biennium and held other offices prior to her presidency. She has been awarded both a PA State Scholarship and Enrichment Grant. Her leadership skills helped guide the EEC, Membership, Nominations, and Leadership committees. As a committee member she supported other leaders in the Creative Arts, Communications, and Visual and Performing Arts committees, to name just a few. Kay is well known for her State presentations. Over the years you may remember Social Media: What's Out There, In a Flash: The 3 C's of International, and her Alaskan Trip (Enrichment Grant).



2023 Pennsylvania DKG Purposeful Seminar Sandra Smith Bull, Chi

Authors from His Holiness Dalai Lama to Victor Frankl to Rick Warren to a lady named Edith Hall* have written about finding purpose, meaning, and fulfillment in life. And these books sell many, many copies. We are interested in finding meaning, not only in our own lives, but in the efforts of organizations who put the needs of others over personal aggrandizement and the bottom line. Certainly Delta Kappa Gamma and its members have benefited from the thousands of projects, scholarships,



grants, and other efforts that have changed lives all over the world. It is gratifying to help others. It's also inspiring to learn about other organizations who work to change lives for the better, especially in the world we now find ourselves.

The Pennsylvania Purposeful Seminar started on the evening of June 20 with two presentations that defined the nonprofit organizations we would visit the next day. The first presentation was made by Steve Jacobs, company stores general manager for Ten Thousand Villages and Shannon Mottern, store manager for Ten Thousand Villages in Kitchen Kettle Village. Steve presented the mission of Ten Thousand Villages with its emphasis on supporting artisans in developing countries and the fair-trade process. We learned that as an agreement is made with an artisan or group of artisans, an interest-free loan is made to cover 50% of costs so that materials, etc. can be purchased and that the rest of the agreed costs including profit are made before the product is shipped. Shannon shared candy from the store and also stories from artisans. Especially touching to me was the story of artisans in Accra, Ghana and their multi-stage processing of shea butter cream for skin. We were impressed with all the work in this process. It was gratifying for me to learn later that the makers of the containers for the butter and even the artisans that make the decorations for the container are a part of the fair-trade agreement.

The second presentation was made by Carol A. Zook, manager of the Mennonite Central Committee Materials Processing Center, who described the mission and range of the center. A wide variety of necessities are collected, packaged, and shipped to countries around the world to aid refugees and other victims of war, repression, hunger and poverty. She described some of the kits and other materials the center disperses, but she said seeing the work was much more revealing than any descriptions. She was so right!

Bright and early next morning we set off for Kitchen Kettle Village in Intercourse, PA. Who wouldn't be excited about the prospect of seeing the Ten Thousand Villages store in person in such a quaint locale? We were given time on our own to visit the store, talk to Shannon, and perhaps purchase intriguing items (I headed straight to the shea butter!). Spending money there felt like being a part of the fair-trade agreement ourselves and that felt good. After time to browse in other shops and have lunch, we headed to the Mennonite Materials Resource Center.

At the center we were divided into groups to see each section and hear a description of what was done there by volunteers and center staff. It was incredible! We were amazed at the volume of what was being prepared for shipment. For example, one area was for making comforters (made by volunteers) ready for shipment. I was mesmerized by a machine that took many of the comforters and squished them down to a manageable bale-like size for packaging and shipping. We saw school supply kits and dignity kits being assembled and cans of meats being inspected and packaged. The dignity kits were especially touching – these kits included toiletries and washable sanitary supplies so girls in developing countries could go to school all month. We saw fine quilts being made. These are sold to help fund the center. Then came the highlight of the visit: we each chose an area in which to actually work for a couple of hours. My area was working with the comforters to "knot" the three layers of material together at the corners of the patches to keep the comforters together. Harder than it sounds! But it was so very satisfying to know that we contributed even a little to such a worthwhile endeavor.

Reading about adding meaning to life can be very helpful. Actually learning and participating in real world settings not only adds meaning to our own lives but ripples to others as well. This was a rewarding seminar of learning and especially of doing with purpose. Many thanks to Royce Boyd and Dr. Lyn Schmid for arranging this experience.

The PA State Scholarship Committee presented the following individuals scholarships to aid them in the pursuit of doctorate and master's degrees. The Committee commends these women as they advance in their professional growth as women educators.



Rose Ann Fulena, Alpha Sigma, received the Dr. Irene Murphy Award. She has passed the halfway point in her three-year cohort studies for a doctorate degree in Instructional Management and Leadership at Robert Morris University. Rose Ann has set her goal to grow both as a teacher and as the Executive Director of the Pennsylvania Association of Student Councils. The skills and knowledge she has already acquired are evident in her leadership roles. She teaches math in the Union Area School District. Rose Ann was also presented with the Rebecca Place Honorary Award to recognize her many contributions and service to her chapter and the state organization.

Lauren Blatchford, Alpha Sigma, received the Past State Presidents Memorial Award. Lauren is in the cohort program with Rose Ann Fulena and is also pursuing a doctorate degree in Instructional Leadership and Management at Robert Morris University. Her ultimate goal is to teach pre-service teachers in a collegiate setting to become effective and successful teachers integrating technology in their classrooms. She currently teaches English in the Union Area School District.



Andrea Rutledge, Chi, received the Margaret J. Wolf Award.

She has earned two master's degrees and has been accepted to Widener University to achieve an Instructional Coaching Certificate which will lead into her doctoral program in Cognitive Studies in Reading. Joyce Bigley, Alpha Nu, is a science teacher who will use her grant to stimulate the personal and professional growth of others to participate in appropriate programs of action. She wants to learn more about the geothermal energy and the conservation practices being used in national parks and reserves as she travels to Yellowstone and the Grand Teton National Parks. Her second purpose will take her to the Black Hills of South Dakota to acquire more historical background to inform others of the economic, social, political, educational, and cultural issues the indigenous people are facing over the Mt. Rushmore National Memorial and the Badlands National Parks which are located on their tribal lands.

Elizabeth "Liz" Brewer, Sigma, will embark on a follow-up voyage to last summer's excursion on the Queen Mary II with a trip this year around Alaska on Queen Elizabeth II. Liz's insatiable curiosity and desire to investigate history of her immigrant ancestors who journeyed on the Cunard ocean liners from England to New York sparks her desire to vicariously experience the history of past family adventures.





Rebecca Hilzinger, Alpha Epsilon, will be heading to Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island with a friend and another grant recipient, Ann Ryan, to explore the geologic and historical aspects of the areas. Rebecca is interested in knitting and fiber arts. Prince Edward Island is home to a fiber arts community where she will be able to explore alpaca and sheep farms processing the fiber in historical and modern ways. She looks forward to learning about the local culture and history.

Melissa Ostrowski, Chi, will travel with her husband to visit sites on the U.S. Civil Rights
Trail traveling from Nashville to Jackson, Birmingham, and ending in Memphis. As a
school counselor, she is aware and empathetic of the unique value of all of her students. She
develops this awareness through reading, conversing, and traveling to understand the
perspectives and cultural backgrounds of her students. She will continue her travels this
summer with this grant to more destinations which address human and civil rights.





Karen Prince, Alpha Omicron, will embark on a cruise to Alaska and the Northwest Canadian Coast to increase her knowledge and appreciation of the history and culture of Alaska and to understand how earth's forces created the geological features. Cruising along the coast of Glacier Bay National Park, she will have the opportunity to view blue glaciers, whales, and other native wildlife and marine life. She will also encourage and demonstrate to her chapter sisters how to complete the application for an enrichment grant.

Ann Ryan, Alpha Mu, will be traveling to Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island with her friend, Rebecca Hilzinger. The enrichment grant will enable her to expand her knowledge to learn about geologic and historical aspects of those areas. Ann, as a secondary science teacher, is interested in the geologic features of the Bay of Fundy and its tides. Prince Edward Island offers opportunities to see and learn about the processing of the alpaca and sheep fibers since fiber arts and knitting are her interests. She will also have the opportunity to explore the local lighthouses and learn about local history.

Celebrating Earth Day Everyday Through STEAM Jade Leung, Alpha Xi

April 22 is designated as Earth Day, but there are always opportunities to celebrate Earth Day year-round with children of all ages! Three STEAM Earth Day activities that I have incorporated into my curriculum include the "Junk-a-Saurus," the PA or World Endangered Species Project, and the newly created Earth Day bumper sticker design challenge. All these activities can be adapted for organizations and/or used in the K-12 school setting to help to promote an awareness of environmental concerns in our world.

The "Junk-a-Saurus" Earth Day challenge involves the use of non-perishable recycled items such as cans, bottles, and plastics. Students use the recycled items to build a "junk-a-saurus" dinosaur. As part of the project we discuss how works of art can be used to tell a story and can also incorporate scientific concepts and themes. This challenge can be adapted to any age group and ability. To incorporate a technology component, a requirement can be to engineer the dinosaur to move or complete a task such as opening and closing its mouth. To incorporate math you can set up puzzles that are math problems students have to solve in an "escape room" like fashion. As students solve the puzzles, they unlock items they can use for their dinosaur such as metal cans or



plastic bottles. For a more scientific dinosaur students can research a particular dinosaur of interest to build and provide a fact page about the dinosaur they tried to build. Once all the dinosaurs are constructed, they can be put on display to promote an awareness of recycling.



The Endangered Species project introduces students to an appreciation for how museum dioramas are constructed and the vast array of professional expertise required to properly open an exhibit. Students focus on a Pennsylvania endangered species or an organism that is listed on the worldwide endangered species list. Students research the organism and construct a model of the organism in its habitat. Non-perishable recycled items such as paper towel rolls, shoe boxes, coffee filters, and construction paper are used to make the construction paper

dioramas.

Students research an organism of interest and laws that exist in protecting the organism. Part of project also involves learning about the unique team that is required to construct and display a museum exhibit. All these lessons are put together for the final project where students construct a 3D organism in its habitat and include a fact sheet about the organism. A classroom "museum exhibit" is created in the room to showcase the projects. To become more engaged in the exhibit, students vote on their favorites and they are showcased

Bumper stickers are an excellent way to voice your opinion and personalize your vehicle, room, or bulletin board with your favorite messages. In this short activity students take a stance on an environmental concern and design a bumper sticker using their own artistic flair (since these are done by hand and not computer generated). Their bumper sticker can include words and phrases to help promote an awareness of their environmental concern. This activity can be enhanced to include business aspects and consumer research looking at the cost of bumper stickers and public opinion about the effectiveness of messages on bumper stickers.

Colleen was a second grade teacher in the South Western School District, Hanover, PA. She taught second grade for thirty-eight years, first at Park Hills Elementary, but most of her career was spent at West Manheim Elementary. Colleen had been named as a South Western School District Teacher of the Year and was also recognized by Shippensburg University as an Outstanding Educator.

Norma McLean Lambda May 15, 2023

Norma was a thirty-two-year member of Lambda. She was an active member and served on various chapter committees. 

As it has done for over two decades, Alpha Nu has fostered the Write-Read-Write program. The goal of this initiative is to encourage lifetime readers in elementary schools. This year's school selection was spearheaded by Holy Trinity teacher and DKG member Kathy Gabriel.

Months before the actual book distribution, students were asked to write a letter to members of DKG. Each letter brought a clear understanding of what the child loved about books and why the child enjoyed a particular genre. 
Alpha Upsilon
