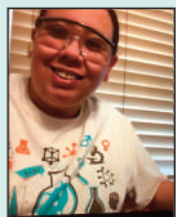

At-Home Science Extravaganza

Let's continue the STEAM train! The focus of this article is on having an "At-Home Science Extravaganza" and things that can be done with basic materials that you could find in your house. Last year when my school district was completely remote, my kitchen became the laboratory to help engage students in science (picture shows the at-home science kitchen lab!). I created videos of the labs that we studied in class while working remotely from our homes. I have chosen four different activities that I have used for Scout workshops and/or schools. They can be applied to almost any age level depending on the depth of the discussion level. The four activities involve basic materials that are cost efficient and easy to obtain and travel with, if you are teaching a workshop or event where you need to bring supplies. It was difficult to choose only four. The possibilities are endless for an "At-Home Science Extravaganza!"



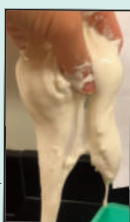

Slime:

Materials: corn starch, water, bucket, spoon or utensil

Description: Mix the corn starch and water to a consistency where it can form into a ball in your hands but can turn into a liquid when the pressure from your hand is released (picture shows the slime changing from a solid to a liquid). This



is a "trial and error" process, so take your time and add a little bit of water at a time to reach the desired consistency. You can teach about phases of matter and unique examples that exist in the world by using fancy scientific terms such as "Non-Newtonian fluid" to describe your creation. Kids of all ages enjoy getting their hands dirty in this science application!

Milk Rainbow:

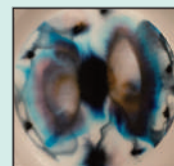
Materials: small bowl/dish, 4 colors of food coloring, dish soap, Vitamin D milk, 2% milk
Description: Place the bowl/dish on a flat surface. Pour enough vitamin D milk into the bowl to cover the bottom of the dish. Setup two more bowls the same way: one bowl with water and one with 2% milk. Do not disrupt the bowls. In each bowl place 1 drop of food coloring like a compass (N,S,E,W) alternating colors so that all 4 colors are in the dish. Colors should be on the edges of the dish but not touching the dish side. After adding the food coloring, add 1-2 drops of dish soap to the center of the dish. You will be amazed at the event that unfolds (picture shows the colors mixing after the dish soap is added to the center). You can teach kids about proteins and focus on how dish soap breaks apart proteins by comparing the vitamin D milk and 2% milk. You can also teach about surface tension and how the surface tension of the milk is broken when dish soap is added. The water dish is a control, and you do not see a reaction because there are no proteins in it!



Coffee Filter Butterfly:

Materials: washable black markers, coffee filters, clothes pin, cup

Description: Draw on the coffee filter using only the black washable marker. You can make a design or draw an image. Fold the coffee filter in half 2-3 times so that it is like a triangle. Take the cup and fill it with water. Dip the pointed edge of the coffee filter into the water. Allow the water to travel up the filter and remove the filter when the water is on the edge of the top of the filter. Carefully, unfold your filter and look at your artistic masterpiece (picture shows one example). Every design will be unique based on how the marker separates! When it is dry, you can fold it in half and place a clothespin in the center. Add eyes to the clothespin and you have created a butterfly! You can teach about chromatography and tie this activity into photosynthesis and the importance of colors in our world. You can also discuss how the color black contains all the other colors (colors separate from the black marker when water is added to it). Another route would be to teach about absorption of water across a membrane. You can try this activity with the coffee filter, cardboard, and a plain sheet of paper and compare the results based on the composition of the material. If you wanted to truly put on your science thinking cap you could even set up the lab with a black permanent marker and discuss the differences with a permanent marker versus a washable marker.

US Forum Update

Understanding Climate Change

On November 3rd I participated in a webinar on Understanding Climate Change. Dr. Ralph Propper was the speaker. He is the President of the Environmental Council of Sacramento. He spoke about what to expect if the temperature rises just two degrees. We can expect river flooding, 90% of the coral reefs will be bleached and we can expect droughts to last four months longer.

He did offer suggestions on reducing our carbon dioxide production. This is a world issue so countries need to work together in programs such as the Paris Climate Accord. He suggests going to electric vehicles. Many countries are banning gas vehicles. Using renewable energy sources rather than fossil fuels. Carbon pricing is being enacted around

the globe. Making consumers pay a tax for the amount of greenhouse gases they produce will make them look for more efficient energy sources. He also spoke about things that we can do like insulating our homes, making sure we have good windows, using heat pumps and planting trees.

He proposed that if \$200 billion dollars were invested every year in energy efficiency and clean energy in the United States - 4.2 million jobs would be created by 2030 and the 2030 unemployment rate would be 1.5%.

He feels the most critical actions we can take are to educate people about reducing their carbon footprint, communicating with elected officials so they know we are concerned about climate change and voting. If you are a bill watcher, here are a few current federal legislative initiatives; HR 2467- PFAS Action Act of 2021, HR 3607- Buy Green Act of 2021, and HR 1780- the Paris Climate Disclosure Act.

If we all do our part, our planet will be around for future generations.

UPDATE – HISTORICAL RECORDS COMMITTEE

Hello from Historical Records! Here's an update on the activities of the Committee during the past few months. I am excited to say that we have achieved two of the goals set for our committee by President Eileen! At the Executive Board Meeting during the summer, we were tasked with:

1.) meeting with the new archivist at Paterno Library to ascertain the status of our collection – and a few missing items

2.) investigate the possibility of moving our DKG collection to an alternate location for safekeeping.

The Committee did look for Historical Societies, libraries, and secure storage facilities in the State College area as possible homes for the DKG PA State collection. A

variety of possibilities were considered.

In November, President Eileen, Past International and State President Dr. Lyn, First Vice President Royce, and I went to Penn State to meet with Ben Goldman, the collection's new archivist, to address some of our concerns. Between COVID closings of Paterno Library, communication issues with the archivists, and staff changes, our list of concerns had grown. Specifically, the lack of an updated index of materials since 2014, missing materials, and the inability to use some of our own items needed for Convention. During the meeting, Ben indicated that he would in fact go through our collection to see what is there; what items are not relevant to the collection; what items may be found elsewhere; and ways in which we can provide better access to our DKG materials. Because of

the nature of courses in education and women's studies offered at PSU, and because more than three or four people in our organization would highly benefit from access to the collection, we decided as a group that it would be *much better* if we opened the collection to anyone with an AEON account. While we cannot and will not be able to remove materials from the archives for public use, it was also suggested that we rewrite the *Deed of Gift* and remove some items permanently from the collection (the artwork that we need for Convention and a few items unrelated directly to DKG PA State Organization). That was done onsite! Since our meeting, Ben has culled some items from the collection. They will be returned to the chapters from which they came. As time allows, the collection index will be updated. Now

books or other objects to use as weights

Description:

Decide on the number of materials for each group (number of gumdrops and toothpicks). Once students have their materials, they are challenged with building the strongest gumdrop dome. After the time limit, test the domes by placing books or other heavy objects on top of them. Once a dome



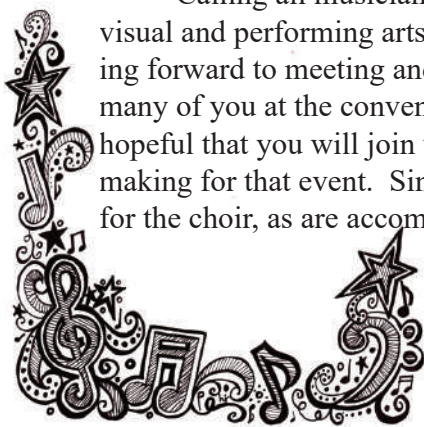
collapses, if you are working with upper-level students, you can have them analyze the critical failure point and talk about structural engineering and shape design. For younger kids you can show them different forces of tension and compression by having them line up with a partner and lean towards their partner with their hands in front of them. As they lean into their partner and their palms touch, they are experiencing a force. As they interlock hands with their partners and slowly lean back, they are experiencing

another type of force. Of course, with covid, the student engagement may be limited, but building the structures is always fun. You may also use geometric spheres to teach about forces. The sphere in the picture collapses into a smaller ball when the pressure is released from holding it. A discussion of forces helps students understand why their structure collapses and gives them an idea of the strongest type of shape they need to build (emphasis on triangles and a reinforced base).

MOVING FORWARD WITH *DKGNext!*

DKG was founded in the early part of the 20th century when long distance communication happened via telegrams; when long distance travel was done via trains and ocean liners; when automobiles were just beginning to replace personal transportation modes of bicycles and horse drawn carriages; when the radio provided the news and entertainment since the first household television was still two years away; and when women, who had only gained the right to vote nine years earlier, still had to meet “in secret.” How does an organization founded nearly 100 years ago stay relevant, vital, and vibrant in the 21st century, a century that communicates, travels, and socializes vastly different due to all the advances in technology? It does so by keeping its fingers on the pulse of the organization through targeted “think tank” sessions with its members.

That is exactly what DKG has been doing for the past seven years through the *DKGNext!* initiative. Created in 2015 by Past International President Lyn Schmid (member of PA’s Chi Chapter), *DKGNext!* brings together diverse members of the organization to talk about what it will take to keep the Society moving forward and how to overcome any challenges seen in that path forward. The first *DKGNext!* team was comprised of seven women representing Generation Y (children and grandchildren of the Baby Boomer Generation; now also known as Millennials) who ranged in age from 28-36. This group was selected to provide insight from the younger members of the Society into what was needed to “create a culture for welcoming more Generation Y/Millennials”(and now Generation Z women) into DKG.

I was honored and thrilled to be a part of the *DKGNext!* 2021 team that met in November in Austin, Texas with President Becky Sadowski and Executive Director Nita Scott. As one who loves change, planning, and visioning, *DKGNext!* was a dream come true for me (literally, as back in 2015 I had completed an application to be a part of the original team).

Some of the suggestions for staying relevant, vibrant, and vital brought forward by our team included continuing to shift the mindset that DKG is a

“secret society” to one that has DKG highly visible, not only in schools but also in the communities the chapters serve; continuing to shift the mindset about membership eligibility; matching chapter activities with community needs related to education, women, and children; and extending visibility of chapter activities beyond traditional print modes by using a variety of social media platforms. (For a more complete list of suggestions, see the article on page 20 of the Jan/Feb 2022 issue of the DKG News.)

The team recognized that keeping DKG relevant, vibrant, and vital requires constant change and change does not come without challenges. Some of those challenges include the multi-generational and multi-cultural makeup of DKG members and the need to balance all we do to honor this diversity, mindsets steeped in tradition and hesitant to change, levels of technological expertise that vary in depth and breadth, acceptance of different perspectives and skill sets, the desire for things to change quickly, and competition for members with other organizations. Suggestions for how to overcome some of the challenges were also presented to the DKG leadership and at the 2022 Convention in New Orleans, *DKGNext!* team members will begin to address some of the challenges.

The work to keep DKG moving forward into its next 100 years doesn’t just rest with members of the *DKGNext!* team. As members of DKG, it is up to all of us to look at what is happening in our local schools and communities and determine what it is that will help DKG attract new members so we can continue to make a difference for education, women, and children; continue to promote the professional and personal growth of our members; continue to promote excellence in education; and, continue to implement the Seven Purposes of the Society. All of us in the PA State Organization have a role in moving DKG forward. Let’s use our voice. I ask that you send me any thoughts, ideas, or suggestions you have for what you think it will take for DKG to move forward. Let’s work to make it the best it can be as we move it into its next 100 years!

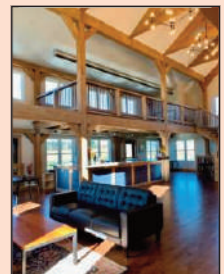

On the Road Again!

In August of 2021, my husband, Frank, and I were singing, *On the Road Again* as we set off from Pennsylvania with our two youngest grandchildren, Orlaith, 10 and Tadhg 8. Our hope was to instill a love of our country and for them to gain an understanding of its vastness and beauty. We covered fifteen states in two weeks and traveled 5,558 miles; a bit of a whirlwind, but we loved every minute of it!

In Kentucky, the children experienced their first zip lining experience, while at the “Ark Encounter.” They were able to get over their initial nervousness and were excited as they zipped to the ground. The “Ark,” built to scale, is a model of Noah’s biblical ark. It allowed the children to visualize



how Noah, his family, and the animals survived the flood. Then driving through St. Louis, we saw the Arch and the stadium where the Cardinals play. Part of the afternoon in Kansas, we explored the Wizard of Oz Museum, seeing Dorothy, Toto, the Scarecrow, Tin Man and Lion. 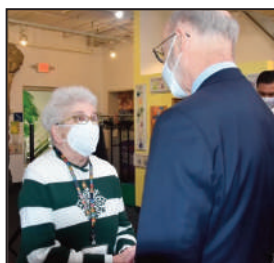
Erie

The EEC completed the Preschool Project in October 2021. Each year the committee provides books, lesson plans, and materials

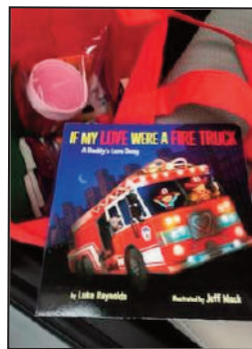

The Beta Epsilon Educational Excellence Committee could

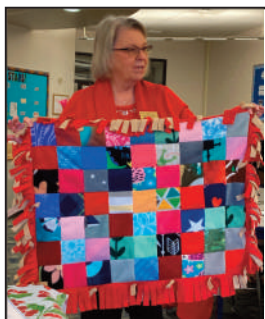


not complete these projects without the generous donations and assistance from the Beta Epsilon chapter members.

Sigma

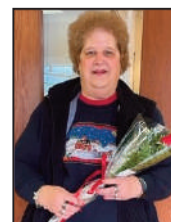

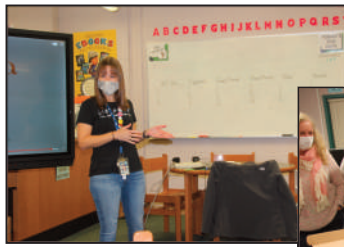
