Jean was initiated into Delta Kappa Gamma as a charter member of Maryland's Omega Chapter in 1973. She has held many offices and chaired a variety of committees. A Golden Gift Leadership/Management recipient, Jean has given extensive service to the Society. Her experiences include: 1998 international first vice president, a member of the Educational Foundation Board of Trustees, Administrative Board, the International Speakers Fund Committee and Constitution Committee chairman. She also served on the 1986-1988 International Leadership Development and 1990-1992 World Fellowships Committees. Other offices

included Maryland president and northeast regional director. Her distinguished service to the Society earned her the International Achievement Award in 2001.

Jean received a bachelor's degree from Howard University, Washington, D.C. and a master's degree from Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, Maryland. A mathematics educator, she has chaired her high school mathematics department and served as a curriculum development specialist.

She is active in her community serving the Association of Community Volunteers, Hospice and Mt. Olive A.M.E. Church/Glenmont U.M. Church. Her strong spiritual qualities make her a powerful motivational and inspirational speaker.

In my first Keystonian message, I talked about transitions and traditions. Each new biennium has faced the task of picking up the beat from the previous biennium and continuing the "forward moving ever" momentum. Your Executive Committee has enthusiastically met that imposing task.

State to Induct Honorary Members

Mary V. Leftridge Byrd serves with the PA Department of Corrections as superintendent of the State Correctional Institution in Chester, PA. This is a 1,200 bed correctional institution for men, which provides an institution-wide Therapeutic Community followed by aftercare.

SCI-Chester is one of two state correctional institutions in the nation with this unique mission.

At the 2002 Alpha Alpha State Convention in State College, PA, Ms. Byrd held the Saturday evening delegates spellbound with her address, Leadership, Lessons, Legacy, in which she discussed her life's path with humor and pathos. She has served as a presenter at many local, statewide, and national conferences and symposia, some of which are the American Correctional Association, Young Women's Christian Association, National Association of Blacks in Criminal Justice, and the Maryland and Pennsylvania Women's Legislative Caucus. In 1999 she was appointed to the national Minority Aids Commission.

Superintendent Leftridge Byrd is immediate past chair of the American Correctional Association's Women Working in Corrections Committee and is immediate past president of the National Association on Programs for Female Offenders. She has served on a national working group on unintended consequences experienced by children and families of incarcerated men and women. In addition, she was identified to work with a group of professionals on rewriting curriculum on Critical Issues in Managing Women Offenders and has served as expert witness and consultant on litigation related to cross gender supervision, and programs for women offenders.

During her address in 2002, Ms. Leftridge Byrd was very proud to tell the convention body that she is Mary and Clifton's daughter; Clifton, Justin, Aly and Melynee's aunt; Embria's wife; Kristyn, Clifton, and Lynda's sister; and that she has 1,100 sons that she takes care of 24 hours of every day.

Wanda Filer, MD

Wanda Filer, MD, is a family physician in York, Pennsylvania. She is the founder of the Strategic Health Institute, an organization devoted to health improvement by collaborative projects which build solid public policy through research, advocacy, and media initiatives. In this capacity, Dr. Filer serves



as a health consultant for many organizations including WGAL-TV 8, Lancaster, PA. The 5 PM nightly news commentary she presents on television reaches more than one million viewers. Her HealthFiles pieces are in the process of being nationally syndicated.

She has a particular interest in improving the healthcare response to domestic violence and sexual assault in this country. Improving care for underserved and at-risk populations, as well as women's health, are strong areas of her professional focus. Dr. Filer graduated from Gannon University in Erie and Hahnemann University in Philadelphia. She is the VP/President-Elect of the Pennsylvania Academy of Family Physicians and is a member of numerous organizations. She is currently working with the American Cancer Society of Pennsylvania, as VP/President Elect and the Colorectal Cancer Initiative legislative/advocacy chair to ensure passage of legislation that will cover screening tests for Pennsylvanians.

Dr. Filer is one of five individuals leading the Pennsylvania Domestic Violence Response Healthcare Standards project. The 2002 Athena Award given by the York County Chamber of Commerce is one of many recognitions that she has received. She has the distinction of being named the first Physician General of Pennsylvania in the administration of Governor Tom Ridge.

Dr. Filer is married to Robert Filer, MD, a fertility specialist, and they have two daughters – Katie, age 13, and Becky, age 12 – and two golden retrievers.

Alpha Alpha State Convention Project:



This project came about when our president was at the International Convention at Little Rock and members attending brought books to



Three bills containing 30 and out retirement legislation have been introduced so far; two in the House and one in the Senate.

LEGACIES

Pennsylvania's First Women Representatives (continued from Legislative Link article in the Winter issue of The Keystonian)

Helen Grimes (R) Allegheny 1923-30 Ms. Grimes was the first woman to address the House of Representatives. She was complimented on her effective reading of parts of Abraham Lincoln's second inaugural address. She was born in Pittsburgh.

- Lillie H. Pitts (R) Philadelphia 1923-32 Ms. Pitts graduated from the Wilkes-Barre Female Institute and later from West Walnut St. Seminary in Philadelphia.
- 7. Martha G. Speiser (R) Philadelphia 1923-24 Martha was born in Ireland in 1884 and educated in the Philadelphia public schools. She and her husband, Rep. Maurice Speiser, were active in the arts community. They hosted musicians, painters, and writers in their home. She donated a Modigliani sculpture to the Philadelphia Museum of Art . She also contributed works to the Museum of Modern Art in New York.
- 8. Martha G. Thomas (R) Chester 1923-26 Thomas was the joint owner of a 200 acre piece of farmland, part of the original tract bought from William Penn by the first Thomas family members who arrived in the colonies.

Born in 1869, she earned a degree from Bryn Mawr College. She was a member of the Women's Committee for the Council of National Defense for Chester County; chairman of the Chester County War Loan Organization; Vice President, PA League of Girl's Clubs; Vice President, League of Women Voters, Chester County; and Treasurer, PA League of Women Voters.

In the first election allowing women candidates in 1922, reporters noted..."only the women seemed active and did much work in getting out voters, and conducting automobiles in true campaign style; while many were early at the voting places and cast the first votes...as a result early returns indicated women may figure among the winners." *



When you have to wait two years for a speaker, you might wonder if the program will be worth the wait. Sisters of Alpha Nu Chapter found that it was. How fortunate for our chapter that an internationally-known speaker who lives locally in the Bucks County area had as his motto "Saving Lives Through Education," a motto applicable to Delta Kappa Gamma members near and far! In a program entitled "Living Safely in a Dangerous World," Mr. Charles Denney, CEO of Infinity Worldwide Training and president of the National Association of Safety Trainers, energized our membership at our recent October meeting with a fact-filled presentation.

Previously featured on various network talk shows and four times named National Speaker of the year by the Citizens Against Crime group, Charles' "fast-talking Southern pitch" gave us timely insights. His light-hearted presentation provided us with school and classroom safety tips. Through demonstrations with members present, he addressed personal safety on the homefront as well as for travelers, with a slant relevant to women's perspectives.

Although Mr. Denney's presentation was compressed into a fifty-minute delivery for our chapter, he does speak to large groups and has about a two-hour program which he gives for school district in-service programs. We can all benefit from networking to access meaningful programs for our membership.



- Avoid editorializing or "coloring" with opinion.
- Submit the news by e-mail, fax, or snail-mail. E-mail is appreciated!
- Include information that might be of interest to Alpha Alpha State members.
- Understand that all copy may be edited.
- Meet the deadlines for newsletter production.
- Include your name, address, phone number and e-mail as the writer. Be sure to include the name of your chapter.

- Send only original photographs, no newspaper photos or copies of newspaper photos.
- Submit black and white glossy photos or color photos with clear contrast.
- Identify all people in the photo (left to right) and include several sentences about the photo on a separate piece of paper for a cutline.
