Author and Illustrator, Lindsay Barrett George, Will Tap Your Talents in a Convention Workshop

indsay Barrett George, author and illustrator of *Inside Mouse*, *Outside Mouse*, will present a workshop during the state convention in June. Just being in her presence and hearing her talk about her love of books is contagious. She says that her first memory of the power and magic

of books still haunts her. When she was very young, she believed that animals pictured in books were alive in those books. A photograph of a "sea monster" in her parents' copy of the Wonder Book of Knowledge looked so real that she wouldn't walk in front of the book, for fear of being bitten. Oh, the power of make-believe!

She became a fine arts major in college and then moved to New York City. She spent all of her free time in her studio making little handmade books, telling stories with only pictures, no words. However, it wasn't until she moved into a log cabin in the woods of Pennsylvania that she realized that she had something to say to children in books.

She loves mysteries and feels as though she has a mystery to solve each time she starts to create one of her books. Writing the story and designing the book is her way of solving the mystery. She says she loves the "aha" moment when the ideas come together and pop, which can be anywhere but usually happens when driving her car, walking her dogs, or the moments just before waking in the early morning. She looks for happy accidents or patterns.

Inside Mouse, Outside Mouse came out of a personal challenge: to see what she could do with her daughter's third-grade homework assignment-writing about a mouse in one's house. The concept of an inside mouse meeting an outside mouse became intriguing for Lindsay and using the graphic idea of two lines meeting in the middle felt right. It took six years for her to work it all out and as a result, she says that her new middle name is "revision."

Her other books include Around the World: Who's Been Here? and In the Woods: Who's Been Here? She has also illustrated Secret Places, Beaver at Long Pond, Christmas at Long Pond and Box Turtle at Long Pond. She most recently produced the artwork for the activity book, Kindergarten, Here I Come. Participants will receive an autographed copy of this publication at the workshop.

Quoting her friend, Vera B. Williams, Lindsay explains the magic of the idea for a book. "Ideas are like fairies. They're in the air everywhere. They could be sitting on your shoulder. They could be sitting on your knee. They could be whispering into your ear. You simply have to hear them." In her workshop, Lindsay will inspire you to keep your ears open...and to have a pencil and paper nearby.

I know how to answer that question. I have my whole planner laid out around my family activities first and then my Delta Kappa Gamma activities.

When I was young and would whine to my mom that I was 'bored' or complain . . . "Why do I bother with this activity? I am not getting anything out of it." She would always reply, "Then you probably haven't invested anything of yourself into it!" And you know I found out that she was right! To me Delta Kappa Gamma is like a giant multiplier. The more I put into this Society, the more I get back in return.

her cramped attic studio five years later, Yates happened upon a simple graphic design for a pin in the shape of a house. Ironically, she found her inspiration — literally — in the garbage.



"I was working next to a frame shop, and one day while walking past the trash can, I saw several matte boards," she explains. "The owner let me have them and I started cutting them into elementary shapes. I put a rectangle over a square, and it looked just like a house to me".

"I sometimes wonder, if I hadn't been homeless, would I have been looking in the trash can," she adds. "Would I have found such profound inspiration somewhere else?" It was a "Eureka!" moment — the House Pin was the perfect fundraiser for a local homeless shelter.

This got Yates thinking about other ways she could use her talents to help her community. Her next project was a fund-raiser pin for a community breakfast program.

And the rest, as they say, is history. Since its inception, Designs By Lucinda has sold more than 3.5 million pins to help raise in excess of \$18 million for nearly 7,500 organizations across the world. Yates' company offers a line of 11 theme-based fund-raising pins and is blessed with a staff of 50 and growing.

Alpha Alpha State has been selling Lucinda's pins to raise funds for the Teacher Training Program in Afghanistan International Project. Our efforts have placed us first in all states for 2005-2006 and fifth overall for the past three years. Chapters are responsible for bringing Lucinda to our State Convention due to their selling over 1,000 of her pins this year to contribute to the project!

In her spare time, Yates has served on the board of trustees for a transitional housing program for women and children in crisis and as the former executive board member of the Maine Coalition for the Homeless. Now she travels the country addressing audiences and giving inspirational talks and small-group presentations to a diverse range of audiences.

Not only will Lucinda be our keynote speaker on Saturday night during the state convention, but she will also be presenting a hands-on workshop during the day on Saturday. Join us as we welcome this extraordinary woman to our gathering.

Did you know that five constituent contacts will cause a legislator to pay serious attention to an issue?

Talk show host Oprah Winfrey is putting the spotlight on female education by opening the Oprah Winfrey Leadership Academy for girls in South Africa. The \$40 million dollar school, which opened on January 2, is located just south of Johannesburg on 52 acres. The school boasts state-of-the-art classrooms and laboratories, a 600-seat theater, a library, beauty salon, yoga studio, and Oprah-decorated dorm rooms. This year 152 seventh and eighth graders, chosen from 3500 lowincome applicants, will attend the school. Next year it will hold 450 students in grades 7-12. Studies have shown that when girls in third world nations get a strong education, it helps their countries in many different ways such as lower infant mortality, improved crop yields, lower HIV infection rates, and per capita income increases. Less than half of southern Africa's girls complete primary school, while only 26 percent enroll in secondary school.

The PA Department of Education is expanding a
"dual enrollment" program that lets high school students
take classes for high school and college credit. Students
who meet the academic requirements can take the
college classes for free as long as they keep their grades
up. The department launched the program last school
year with \$5 million serving 6,736 students. This year
the state is spending \$8 million, boosting the number of
college slots to 30,000. 313 school districts are currently participating. Interested students may begin by
contacting their high school guidance counselor.

As a result of the No Child Left Behind law which requires states to have "highly qualified" teachers for all core academic classes, school systems are continually seeking to raise teacher quality by offering financial incentives. Accordingly, an increasing number of educators are seeking certification from the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards, the highest credential in the teaching profession. The number of board-certified teachers has tripled in the past five years to more than 55,000 nationwide. Applications can take up to 400 hours to complete. Applicants must finish indepth projects, assemble a portfolio that includes a video of themselves teaching, and take an on-line test. Fewer than half of applicants earn certification the first year they apply. The process aims to push teachers to adapt lessons for each child, analyze why certain methods work, reflect on their profession, and share ideas. There is conflicting research on whether students score better on standardized tests when they have a board-certified teacher.

The new Democrat-controlled Congress is proposing to overhaul current education policy by cutting loan interest rates, revising sections of the No Child Left. Behind law, and increasing the government's monetary contribution toward education. These plans are in response to local and national educators calling the five-year-old law flawed. The educators cite unclear interpretations, an overemphasis on testing, and broad demands without providing for the financial resources needed for successful implementation. The No Child Left Behind law is up for reauthorization this year. An informal poll of Washington insiders by the Thomas B. Fordham Foundation found that none believed the law would be reauthorized this year, but rather taken up after the 2008 presidential election.

entoring in education is as natural as breathing air. Experienced educators view mentoring as part of their duty to spread the wealth of knowledge accumulated over their education career to those who are just starting on the road in the teaching profession.

Mentors feel a deep satisfaction and privileged when approached to assist a beginner in the education field. Being a mentor to a mentoree can be done at both the teacher level and the administrative level. Let's look at mentoring from another perspective. As I approach my twenty-seventh year in education it has dawned on me that, "This is not the army I joined all those years ago." Education has changed dramatically. From "No Child Left Behind" to PSSA assessments and progress monitoring, all have changed the face of education. Younger teachers are immersed in this "new field of education." The younger generation have become mentors and the older teachers the mentorees. Even though there is nothing "new under the sun" in education, the younger teachers are now taking center stage in sharing new ways of looking at old methods. Their knowledge of technology is unsurpassed. Their enthusiasm for this thing we call education can be a ray of sunshine on a dark day.

Mentoring is a circle. The sharing of ideas, strategies, and knowledge of curriculum between those beginning and those who are experienced has no beginning or end. The ones that truly benefit from such generosity and unselfishness of spirit are the students. Just as it should be!


