

Making Membership Connections

Connecting members to each other in a chapter creates the energy that sustains and moves a chapter forward. We're all familiar with the parable about the geese. But did you ever think of it as connecting to and nurturing our members. Remember how beautiful and sleek the geese flew in V-formation with one at the head leading the way. The lesson goes on to say that when the lead goose gets tired it rotates back into formation and another takes the reins at the head. Sounds like nurturing to me!

It may be well to remember the geese story as we try
to connect with members. We may all be at different
stages in our educational careers and personal lives. But
regardless of our career stage or personal life we do all
need nurturing. Whether a new member, an elderly and
long-time member, or that member involved in career
and family who is stretched to the limit, nurturing is
needed to retain and support each other. The following
are some ideas that may help as we think about
nurturing each other.

- Use telephone trees and the Internet to contact members and keep them informed about each other, about programs, or about possible topics they may be interested in.
- Carpools help members, whether older, inactive, or active, get to meetings. Just sharing some time with another chapter sister may be all that is needed to nurture and actively engage members in chapter happenings. And of course it is far better and more fun to travel with another!
- Consider offering financial help with members' dues and fees, if needed.
- Create a buddy system so each member can keep in close touch with another member.
- Send personal notes to members of a job well done or of a congratulatory nature. Teachers, particularly, need to get more warm fuzzies in the way of personal notes. Encouragement is motivating!
- Send personal notes or make phone calls to members not attending. Let them know their chapter cares and they were missed.
- Highlight member strengths in chapter activities. Everyone wants to feel needed and know that they contribute to the group no matter how old or of what experience they may have.
- Establish a "Care Group" to regularly check on inactive or older members. Rotate the committee

membership so all members serve in this capacity.

Move the meeting to a home, retirement community, or care facility where a member or members reside to permit their attendance.

Sometimes those who have taken the role of the lead goose find the need to drop back into formation due to family responsibilities, career demands, health, etc.

Everyone needs help from time to time. More than many other organizations, we are a caring Society that does support each other. Be a lead goose and try leading the formation...there are plenty behind you that will be honking you on in support!

PROGRAM OF WORK

As this article is being written in January, the chapter program committee reports are arriving in the mail. I am excited about what I am reading. The reports are showing that some successful programs have been presented, for example, celebrating a chapter's 60th anniversary, celebrating artists and their work, holding a silent auction to raise money for scholarships, sharing member talents with an arts and crafts festival. Several chapters reported their successful programs were linked to their projects. This really shows that as an organization we are concerned with more than just being educators.

Many chapter projects are focusing on children and women with donations of books and quilts to newborns and head-start children, lap quilts for nursing home residents, and collections of items for crisis centers. For the last five years one chapter has sponsored a family literacy night for local school children. One chapter's project had a two-fold purpose: Members made quilt squares that were pieced together and quilt-ed. Then they sold chances on the completed quilt, and the money was used for their scholarship fund. These are examples of our chapters fulfilling the purposes of our Society.

There is evidence that chapters are using the program manual, Passion for Learning: The Essence of Growth. If your chapter is not, there is a wealth of material and ideas in this manual to help chapters plan

and develop meaningful programs. Every chapter should own a copy of this resource. The incoming Program of Work Committee that will be assuming office in the summer should find this an invaluable resource. There are all kinds of programs already planned. You can just pick and choose. The Program of Work Committee should take time to get familiar with this resource.

As programs are being planned, here is something to think about: Each member must be inspired to feel excited about coming to Society events and contributing to the fullest. This happens only when practices and policies are followed that engage the hearts and minds of all those who participate. How can we ensure this success through programs? If your program consists of a topic that every woman educator in your community might learn from and enjoy, then you have planned an appropriate program.

Chapter Program of Work Chairmen are urged to attend the Program Committee Workshop at state convention on Saturday, June 14 for idea sharing and valuable information to help with your chapter responsibilities. There will also be workshops at the two Fall Area Conferences. Watch the summer issue of The Keystonian for details. Your Alpha Alpha State Program of Work Committee is committed to helping chapters, but the chapter counterparts have to make the effort to attend and receive the help.

I am looking forward to meeting many new chapter Program of Work Chairmen at state convention in June.

- + Host a "Bring a book! Buy a book!" used book sale. Members bring gently used books to sell and buy one or two they haven't enjoyed reading yet.
- + "Two for Tea" There are approximately 3000 Delta Kappa Gamma members in our state. Two dollars a member would raise the \$6000 to grow our library. Send a teabag to each member along

with an invitation to sit in the comfort of her own home and read a favorite book. Include a selfaddressed envelope and a donation card to help Ethiopian children read.



The Historical Records committee is pleased to announce that 70+ years of Alpha Alpha State records are now safe and sound at the Paterno Library at Penn State University. They are in a temperature and humidity-controlled environment, and will be safe from fire, flood, and the damage caused by transporting them from person to person around the state.

Members of the Historical Records Committee, Barb Emmer and Rosemary Ruhl, spent a weekend at the home of Chairman Carol Goodman to sort through 16 scrapbooks and dozens of other records. Some of the scrapbooks are 19x24 inches in size, weigh 30 pounds, and cover three or more presidents' bienniums. Repairs were made to many scrapbooks, the items were catalogued, and some wonderful discoveries were made. One of the scrapbooks contains a telegram from Pearl S. Buck, apologizing for not being able to attend the scholarship meeting where her scholarship was to be awarded!!! Also included was a newspaper clipping of Miss Buck meeting with members of Alpha Alpha State. We have tapes of interviews with Vesta Watson and Dr. Mary Willard, first and third presidents of Alpha Alpha State that will be transferred to CD's as soon as possible. The General Educational Development (GED) Diploma is the diploma offered to people who drop out of high school without graduating. In order to attain the GED, the individual must pass a five-part exam that tests basic educational skills in the areas of Critical Reading. English Grammar and Essay Writing, Science, Social Science and Humanities, and Mathematics. This workshop is designed to provide the participants with an overview of the GED test, information about the programs available to study for the test, and the development and norming of the test. Participants will also be challenged to see if they are "smarter than a GED graduate."

Ready, Set, Vote

In this election year, it is the challenge of the US Forum to have every member of Alpha Alpha State utilize their right and freedom and vote, not only in the General Election, but also our state's Primary Election. The deadline to register to vote in Pennsylvania is March 24, 2008 for the Primary Election and the deadline for registering to vote in the General Election is October 6, 2008. Update on Children's Health

On October 25, the House passed H.R. 3963, the revised Children's Health Insurance Program
Reauthorization, by a vote of 265 to 142 - with 222
Democrats and 43 Republicans voting YES. Then, on November 1, the Senate also passed the bill - by a vetoproof margin of 64 to 30 - with 45 Democrats, 17
Republicans, and 2 Independents voting YES. The President vetoed the bill on December 12. On January 23, the House voted on the revised Children's Health Insurance Program bill. House Republicans again narrowly sustained President Bush's veto, with a vote of 260 in favor of passage and 152 against, despite the veto-proof margin in the Senate.

NEA on Educator Tax Relief: Supports

NEA supports expanding the educator tax deduction because it recognizes the sacrifices made by educators who work in America's public schools. Many teachers and education support professionals reach into their own pockets to ensure that classrooms have adequate books, pencils, paper and art supplies.

- Educators are spending more of their own funds each year to supply their classrooms with essentials such as pencils, glue, scissors and facial tissues. NEA's 2003 report, Status of the American Public School Teachers, 2000-2001, found that teachers spent an average of \$443.00 a year on classroom supplies.
- ♦ The National School Supply and Equipment Association found that in 2005-2006, educators spent out of their own pockets an average of \$826.00 for supplies and an additional \$926.00 for instructional materials - for a total of \$1,752.00.
- ◆NEA supports legislation to make the educator deduction permanent, increase it to \$400.00, and expand it to cover professional development expenses.

Take Action!

Improve Access to College for Working and Parenting Student

Announcement from our US Forum "Grassroots Activists"

Our federal financial aid system is designed with the traditional college student in mind, yet part-time and nontraditional students are now the norm on college campuses, and such students are disproportionately women. These students more frequently must balance work, school, and family commitments but have limited access to financial aid. Representative Rush Holt (D-NJ) will soon be introducing the Part-Time Student Assistance Act, which would allow students to exempt more of their income from student aid calculations, provide more on-campus child care, allow for year-round Pell grants, and create a parttime assistance pilot program to develop comprehensive programming aimed at enrolling and graduating part-time students. AAUW strongly supports this legislation, because it takes important steps towards providing nontraditional students greater access to higher education. Nontraditional students-those who are part-time, working, older, or parenting-face unique challenges as they seek to finance a college education. In light of the increasing number of nontraditional and parenting students, legislation must create programs that help these students enter college, stay in college, and earn a degree.



HISTORICAL MOMENT #4

Scholarships

The fifth purpose of Delta Kappa Gamma is to endow scholarships and aid to outstanding teachers in pursuing graduate study, and to grant fellowships to women educators from other countries.

Because our state society expanded slowly, there was not enough money to offer scholarships during the first 11 years. The Scholarship Fund grew with the help of White Elephant sales at each state convention, until by 1948 the Scholarship Committee planned to give out its first scholarship. The fund had accumulated a total of \$2,700, but when it was realized that only the interest on that money could be offered, the plans of the Scholarship Committee had to be put on hold.

By the state convention in June 1951, the Alpha Alpha State Scholarship Committee had raised enough money to grant their first two scholarships of \$100.00 each. Each year the number of scholarships grew and began to be named after much-admired women, like Miss Blanch Foster and Miss Pearl Buck. By 1982 a total of \$7,000 per year was available. At this time scholarships were usually offered for doctoral study only.

Today, on the flexible, Five-year plan, \$100,000 or \$20,000 per year is available to Alpha Alpha State members for a number of educational activities, including Elderhostel, continuing education, travel, an individual project, a research project or presentation of a paper.

Alpha Alpha State members have been very generous over the years in the support of women from other countries in their endeavors to reach their educational goals. Several years ago, Kavena from Namibia, and Honoratha and Elinami, from Tanzania, became our special friends as they studied for, and received their doctoral degrees at Penn State University.

Alpha Alpha State has a long history of providing scholarships for its members and those in need from around the world. We can be very proud to be ...forward moving ever.


