Carol Hughes is the 2016-2018 Northeast Regional Director of DKG. At the international level Carol has served on the Professional Affairs Committee, chaired Non-Dues Revenue Committee,

and graduated from the 2004 Leadership Management Seminar. Carol has been Illinois State President and 1st Vice President. Currently she serves on the board of the Lambda State Foundation for Educational Studies.

Carol received her B.A. in English from Blackburn College in Carlinville, Illinois, and her M.A. in English from the University of Illinois. Having elementary and secondary certifications, she taught at the elementary, middle school, and high school levels. She also taught composition, literature, and secondary education methods at the college level.

For the past 20 years, Carol took a leadership role in raising funds for the American Cancer Society Relay For Life. She was her county's team captain and chair of the Sponsor Committee. Her committee has raised an average of \$33,000 a year in sponsor funds, collectively raising over \$3,000,000.

She is part of an ongoing mission to a church in Novgorod, Russia, that supports a drug/alcohol rehab center. While in Russia, Carol visits and speaks in English classes in a Russian elementary school.

Carol and her husband, Pete, have been married 58 years. They have two children and four grandchildren.

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What I've Learned



Educational Excellence Committee

The goals of the Educational Excellence Committee are to develop programs, projects and activities which empower women through leadership opportunities and promote educational excellence. Since chapter members are the foundation of DKG, where can your members make a difference? Consider some of these ideas for your chapter.

Because they are so important, why not celebrate their membership by having anniversary reunions to honor 5, 10, 15, and 20+ year members. A reunion is always a perfect way to get chapter members together, to invite old friends, to introduce new ones, or to reinstate former members. You might also consider hosting a "New Member Luncheon" for your newest members.

Another chapter meeting idea would be to host an annual jewelry exchange where members donate gently used jewelry to sell at the meeting. The proceeds could then be donated to the World Fellowship Fund.

Some chapters have utilized social setting get-togethers which include prospective members and college senior education majors from nearby

colleges/universities. This outreach would help build new relationships and possibly grow your membership.

Consider stepping outside traditional member prospects and honor women who may not be eligible for membership but who are making a difference in your state or community. Invite these "change makers" to speak at a chapter meeting and thank them for making a difference by inviting these policy-making women to become honorary members.

Encourage members to serve on governing boards or run for political office. DKG members can be appointed to school board positions where they can actively support policies concerning our early career educators or, if elected, participate in making positive changes on educational issues.

Actively explore various leadership opportunities by providing programs, projects and/or activities which will empower members to be "change agents." Where can your members make a difference? What can your members do for DKG? Where can your members utilize their leadership talents and make a difference?

Little Free Libraries: *Chapters Make a Difference!*

Libraries can make a difference in every community. Several chapters have constructed Little Free Libraries and children are enjoying reading. Other chapters help local communities in other ways. They have volunteered their talents by reading to children during story hours. Others have donated books or purchased books for children to encourage reading on their grade levels.

We have chapters who continue to promote

libraries in their communities with financial support, through small fundraisers, raffles, or book sales. All proceeds go to designated libraries.

Free public libraries enrich everyone and our DKG Chapters are making a difference.

News from the U.S. Forum

The U.S. Forum Connection is a free monthly publication sponsored by the United States Forum of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. Dr. Angela Bedenbaugh is the editor of this publication and is the person to contact at Bedenbaugh.Angela@gmail.com if you wish to subscribe. The brief summaries that follow are based on information discussed in the most recent newsletters.

^**Student loan** relief is not on the immediate horizon at the federal level as none of the five or more bills focused on providing financial relief to students, with significant student loan debt, made it out of committee in either the House or Senate.

^The skyrocketing cost of prescription drugs has been a prominent topic in the media over the last several months. **EpiPens** and insulin have been particular concerns. While the

cost of an EpiPen is less than \$100 in France and slightly over \$200 in Germany, the cost of a two pack, the only way it is sold in the United States, is between \$600 and \$650. The shelf-life of this drug ranges from 12 and to 18 months, which results in some pens expiring before they can be used.

One way drug companies are maintaining the higher prices associated with their drug patents is to **combine two drugs** to create a new drug that is patent protected. If you are aware that a prescribed drug is a combination of cheaper drugs, it is possible to save money by getting separate prescriptions for each component of that drug.

^**Excessive lead in drinking water** can come from sources that include lead pipes or the lead solder used to hold pipes together, either within your home or in the community water supplies. To insure the

safety of the water in your home or community, you can request the results of tests conducted by your community water source or have your water tested at a laboratory that does this type of analysis.

^Under consideration are some changes to Social Security.

H.R.2078 would remove the cap on Social Security taxes paid on employment and self-employment compensation. Currently, people who earn over \$118,500 do not pay tax on amounts above that limit. Removing the cap would increase the money in the Social Security Trust Fund due to larger amounts paid in by the extremely wealthy.

H.R.1391 would gradually increase Social Security benefits about 2%, raise the Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) using actual cost-of living expenses, and cut taxes for working seniors whose retirement income is inadequate

to meet actual expenses.

The **Social Security Expansion Act (S.731)** would increase the primary insurance amount for all eligible beneficiaries beginning in 2021, use the Consumer Price Index for Elderly Consumers to calculate the Cost of Living, and increase the special minimum primary insurance amount for lifetime low earners based on years worked. There was no cost of living increase in 2016.



Convention Action to Consider

A proposal to amend Pennsylvania State DKG Standing Rule VII C will be presented to the members and voted on at State Convention in June. The following is the current language and proposed change:

Current wording:

S. R. VII C. Finances for Professional Development and Leadership Conference/Seminar

1. Expenses including mileage at the current rate, parking and turnpike fees, if applicable, meals, lodging at one-half (1/2) the rate of a double room, if applicable, gratuities at 15% (percent) for individuals and the current rate for a group check, and registration fees of state officers and Leadership Development Team shall be paid by the state organization.
2. The expenses of additional state committee chairmen who have been requested to participate in the conference as presenter shall be paid by the state organization. Allowable expenses are mileage at the current rate, parking and turnpike fees if applicable, lodging at one-half (1/2) the rate of a double room if applicable, meals, gratuities at 15% (percent) and registration fee.
3. Limited finances will be available to the host chapter(s) for registration, programs, decorations, and favors.
4. The minimum/maximum registration fee for the conference will be set by the State Finance Committee.

5. The conference treasurer must submit a financial report to the State President and the State Treasurer for the conference within thirty (30) days after the conference. The State Treasurer will supply report forms.

To be amended by deletion and addition of new language as follows:

S. R. VII C. Finances for Professional Development and Leadership Conference/Seminar

1. Expenses including mileage at the current rate, parking and turnpike fees, if applicable, meals, lodging at one-half (1/2) the rate of a double room, if applicable, gratuities at 15% (percent) for individuals and the current rate for a group check, and registration fees of state officers and Leadership Development Team shall be paid by the state organization. Expenses for State officers and committee chairs who have been requested to participate shall be charged to those applicable budgets.
2. The budget is set by the Leadership Development Committee in accordance with the approved state budget.
3. The State Treasurer will compile a financial report to the Finance Committee, Leadership Development Committee, and the State President.

Rationale for change: The changes reflect the current operational practices of the Leadership Training/ Professional Development Seminar.

Enrichment Excursions

Historic Hudson River Region


In October, I visited Westchester County, New York, and Revolutionary War sites along the Hudson River. The fall foliage is at its peak and the temperature is still comfortable.

Fifth grade history books can not do justice to the Revolutionary War period. To make matters worse, programs like

AMC's TURN are not historically correct. In defense of the show, it did make me curious about Washington as a "slymaster." I purchased several books (all excellent) about this time in our past which made this trip most informative and exciting! Text books do not show just how difficult a task General George Wash-

ington endured.

When visiting West Point, one can stand at an area where Gen. Washington and Col. Kosciuszko discussed the importance of the Hudson River and their fears of what Benedict Arnold might have told the British. An interesting fact on the highly recommended West Point tour is that the [statue honoring](#)



Col. Kosciuszko was chosen by the cadets to honor the man from a grateful nation. His efforts were valued by Gen. Washington and are enjoyed by Americans today. Standing in this area of West Point, one can see the importance of the river to Washington and his [advice](#) (see [Hudson page 17](#))

(Hudson from page 16) ers. Reading the books on this time period puts one in awe of George Washington. He was leading brave men most poorly trained and starving, along with several petty and jealous commanders. Governors and Congress were not sending promised supplies. Farmers and local families were more foe than friend.

In December 1780, Washington established his winter headquarters at New

Windsor, south of Newburgh, on the west bank of the Hudson River. The summer of 1781 found Washington confident that he had a strategy that could end a war that had dragged on for seven years. The French arrived and this area close to West Point was a secure area for him to meet and make plans with the French commander, the Comte de Rochambeau, and Henry Knox. The Henry Knox headquarters still stands

and the area is open for picnics. Washington's headquarters was the home of a Dutch widow, now owned by New York State. The tour of the house and grounds is given by a knowledgeable guide which helps one to envision that period of time.

This area is filled with so much history and folklore. Sleepy Hollow is in the area and thankfully, we did not meet up with the Headless Horseman but we did visit the church and

cemetery to pay respects to Washington Irving, who was named after Washington. While a young boy, Irving met his hero.

Thank you Alpha Alpha State for this Enrichment Grant. I learned so much more about the Hudson River region and enjoyed the days spent touring the area. I plan to return because there is still so much more to see.... Hyde Park and the Culinary Institute of America are next!

Amsterdam to Budapest Louise Garverick, Beta Kappa

The Viking Grand European Tour included 13 ports in The Netherlands, Germany, Austria, and Hungary. I boarded the Modi in Amsterdam and left port on October 10, 2016, sailing on the

Rhine to the 19 windmills at Kinderdijk, The Netherlands, a UNESCO site. Families live in the windmills and are entrusted with the operation of the mills to control water levels in this low land.

Sites in Cologne included the 14th century Gothic cathedral.

In Koblenz, I toured the 13th century Marksburg Castle, a UNESCO site, and marveled at the medieval lifestyle of its inhabitants.

Cruising on the middle Rhine and Main rivers was picturesque with castles

nestled in the hills. Walking tours with knowledgeable guides on cobbled streets through the towns of Miltenberg, Wurzburg, Bamberg, Nuremburg, Regensburg, and Passau were full of history.

Very low water levels on the Danube near Regensburg stopped the Modi at Nuremburg. A sister ship, the Skirmir, was sailing toward us from Budapest. At Nuremburg and Passau, passengers on both boats packed their bags, switched boats and continued along their planned itineraries with the Modi and Skirmir retracing their prior routes.

I enjoyed an organ concert at St. Stephen's cathedral in Passau, Germany. In Melk, Austria, I toured the Benedictine Abbey. Highlights in Vienna for me were visits to exhibits of artists Gustav Klimt and Pieter Bruegel.

Our journey ended in Budapest with motor coach and walking tours of both sides of the Danube River. A visit to the bronzed shoes of the Jewish War Memorial along the water was very moving.

I am so very grateful for the support of DKG through an enrichment grant for this amazing trip.
