#### I. Establishing a Little Free Library

The Little Free Library is our adopted state project for this biennium. Nu Chapter is working with students and teachers at the Lebanon County Career and Technology School's woodworking department to build little libraries. The goal is to have one provided by Delta Kappa Gamma in each of the six school districts in Lebanon County. The graphic arts department will design and paint the outside.

Alpha Theta members will support one of their chapter members who has written for a grant to build a Little Free Library.

#### II. Adopting a school or community library

Sigma Chapter donates to a school library in a fivecounty region. The school librarian chooses the books that are needed.

Beta Pi is adopting the Upper Merion Middle School Library by donating books on women leaders who reflect diversity. The chapter is allotting \$200 this biennium to the project.

#### III. Continuing Established Chapter Projects

Educator Project had chapter members creating bulletin boards for new teachers in the Conemaugh Township School District. Six new teachers were the lucky recipients of these bul-

letin board supplies. In partnership with PSEA Central Region (PSEA donated the books) members created *Library*  Story Time Kits. The kits centered on a Disney Thumper theme. Activities were created and supplies donated to six public libraries in Blair and Cambria Counties. There is no slowing down for this chapter as they completed their annual Backpacks for Kids Project. One hundred thirty-six filled backpacks were donated to students in Blair, Cambria, and Somerset Counties. Read about more projects in future issues of *The Keystonian* and hear more at State Convention.

Collecting new and gently used books and donating them to organizations is one of **Kappa** Chapter's projects. Kappa also sends money to *Project Shore* and raises funds by selling BonTon booklets for their two grant-in-aid recipients.

Beta Mu supports the Afafanto Project designed to educate and empower women in northern Ghana. This chapter also supports "Mom's House." This is a non-profit organization that provides education and quality daycare to young, single women who want to finish their education. Beta Mu is donating \$1000 to educate the children attending the daycare.

Alpha Kappa conducts a flea market/yard sale to raise money for their grants in aid. This chapter also fills 40 plastic shoeboxes with personal care items for children ages 4-14. The boxes are distributed at local food pantries and shelters for needy families. With community and chapter support, one of Alpha Kappa's members has collected several hundred books for the elementary libraries in her school district.

#### IV. Supporting Schools for Africa & Early Career Educators

**Beta Pi** contributes \$100 annually to the *Schools for* Africa Project. To support Early Career Educators, these sisters prepare a packet of information about DKG and Beta Pi. Included are invitations to chapter programs and a \$25 gift card to Staples or a local teachers' store. These packets are distributed to new women teachers. Beta Pi budgets \$200 for this project annually.

**Beta Beta Chapter** donates to *Schools for Africa* by holding a book swap with four other chapters. This chapter also collects and compiles a booklet with ways a new teacher can reduce stress for herself and within her classroom. Book chats are held to promote reading interest within the chapter. Another project this chapter participates in is placing books in libraries in memory of deceased chapter members. These are given to the school where the teacher taught.

00 plus days... I did not think the "Budget Impasse" would still be news with the spring newsletter going to press and 2016 well underway. How many of you have pondered over these past several months, as have I, what would happen if you or I were more than two hundred days late in completing an important ask with wide-ranging implications for the health and welfare of our charges? I suspect we would be highly anxious about our failure and the probable consequence of losing our job. My question:
why are members of the State government responsible for passing a least ure and the probable consequence ing a budget not worried about their jobs? Is it because no one is pressuring them to complete this essential task for which they alone

are responsible? The budget matters. There seems to be less publicity about the lack of a budget but that does not mean the consequences do not continue to accrue. Please make your voices heard: Pennsylvanians need a budget.

CTAUN (Committee on Teaching About the United Nations). The Conference at the United Nations – *Stewardship for a Sustainable World: Education in the SDGs* - was held on January 22, 2016 at the United Nations Headquarters in New York City. Among the 525 attendees were a large number of DKG sisters, including 2014-2016 International President Dr. Lyn Schmid, Executive Director Sandra Smith Bull, and Membership Services Admin-

istrator Nita R. Scott, hailing in from Austin,

Texas. For the second time in three years a Pennsylvania sister was a Best Practices Award Winner. Inspired by a project by Lisa Fernandez, Elementary School Counselor in the Warrior Run School District, Ms. Elizabeth Brewer (Sigma Chapter), created a counseling lesson called "Scattering Seeds of Peace." This lesson culminated in students and families sending 562 messages to UN Peacekeepers around the world and the sharing of "recipes for peace" with Ms Fernandez's class in Brooklyn, New York.

The 17 SDGs (Sustainable Development Goals) and the 169 targets that provide an action plan

for meeting the goals are detailed in Transforming Our World: The 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. Ambassador David Donoghue, Permanent Representative of Ireland and Co-Facilitator of the Intergovernmental Consultative Process for the SDGs, described the goals as aspirational and as having three dimensions: economic, social, and environmental. The 17 SDGs are based on the 5 P's of People, Planet, Prosperity, Peace, and Partnership. Agreed to at a signing ceremony at UN Headquarters by 193 Heads of State on September 25, 2015, the SDGs are broad enough that every country has some distance to move forward for every target. Symbolizing the need to energize youth to invest in the attainment of this worldwide agenda, 200 young people joined the Heads of State at the signing ceremony. Among one of many remarkable aspects of the SDGs is the call to action and importance of involvement at all levels of community. The SDGs invite international and governmental cooperation as well as commitment from businesses and individuals.

Two panels, Ending Hunger and Taking Care of the Earth, and a roundtable, Committing to the SDGs, provided multiple speakers on these topics and

expanded on the work needed in the respective goals. Even a brief description of each presenter is beyond the scope of this article. however, I would like to highlight a few comments and statistics I found particularly noteworthy and stunning:

- ~~ 1 in 9 people are undernourished.
- ~~ 165 million children are stunted due to lack of adequate nutrition.
- ~~ One third of the food supply (1.3 billion tons) goes to waste every year.
- ~~ All countries have the resources to feed their people.
- ~~ Food insufficiency is a matter of distribution and politics, not supply and demand.
- ~~ Conflict is development in reverse.
- ~~ The Global Hunger Index reports a 300% increase in food insecurity in areas of conflict or war.
- ~~ The number of people living in extreme poverty has been cut in half since *1990.*

One of the reasons I appreciate CTAUN is the detail with which the problems are defined. Another reason I appreciate CTAUN is the hope it provides for solving the problems. The re-

sources discussed in that one day could take days to fully research and exhaust. The good news is that any individual taking one step forward on a SDG moves us closer to the better world for all we strive to achieve.

What can you do? Visit www.TeachUN.ORG for ideas and curricula. Introduce the concept of the SDGs to your class. Inspire your students to adopt them and add their unique response to having a better world. Tackle a project on your own.

The final event of the day was the presentation of "The Future She Deserves" by the GIRL Be Heard Theater Group. Through song, movement, and verse written by the girls themselves, this theater group provides a forum for voicing concerns and realities from the lives of young women. The piece, "The Summer the Bees Disappeared", described the loss and destruction of nature and community, both social and physical, from oil drilling. "A Bagel for Emily" highlighted the reality of being in need while living within the realm of those who have much more than enough. The performances were heartrending, poignant, inspiring, and beautiful. A perfect punctuation to a day that presented challenges but also the path to a better future.

#### SAN ANTONIO EXPERIENCE Deborah Ceraso, Alpha Theta

The stars were most definitely in alignment above the "Lone Star" state this past December as I spent an unforgettable week in San Antonio, Texas!

Even our hotel itself (the former **National** Alamo Bank) was a historical site.



perched above the River Walk in all its stained glass and golden glory. The weather was a balmy 65-70 degrees with blue skies and unlimited sunshine every day.

After settling into our amazing hotel, my husband and I headed out to an authentic bar-bque for lunch then on to the San

Fernando Cathedral, the oldest cathedral in the United States. Buried here are the re-



mains of Davy Crockett, William Travis, and Jim Bowie. We also attended mass there on Sunday. Next, we walked to "La Villita" and met many of the artisans working on their creations of silver jewelry, pottery, and leather. We ended the day strolling along the River Walk, taking in the beauty of the Christmas lights and the luminarias that lined the walkways. The air was filled with carolers riding by in their boats, spreading holiday cheer!

Day 2 began with a riverboat tour and our own self-guided tour through the Spanish Governor's Palace, dating back to 1722. The Historic Market was nearby so we immersed ourselves in the Mexican culture, with vendors selling their wares and churros, and a Ballet Folklorico performance in the main plaza of the market. We had a wonderful Mexican dinner at "Mi Tierra" with entertainment from a Mexican Elvis.

My main interest for this trip were the missions but the local tours only went to the 2 largest ones. After some investigating at the visitors' center, we located a local historian who took us on a private half day tour to all the missions I wanted to see: the missions of San Juan, Concepcion, Espada and San Jose. We were also able to walk to the acequia and the dam, to better under-

stand the water system and the geography of the land.



To round out day 3, we took a 2hour walking tour of the Alamo.

The next day we walked to Hemisfair Park and went up to the observatory in the Tower of the Americas, took



numerous photographs and watched the 4D movie, "Skies Over Texas." A stone's throw from the tower was the Institute of Texas Cultures where we spent the remainder of the day learning about the variety of ethnic groups in the San Antonio region and their contributions to the city. After dinner, we made our way back to Alamo Square to enjoy the holiday lights and see the giant Christmas tree dedicated to the San Antonio Spurs.

The morning of Day 5 was spent strolling through King William District, touring the Geunther House (Grist Mill) and enjoyed the gingerbread house display, created with 100 lbs. of candy after 200 hours of work. We toured several mansions in the area and learned the history of the German entrepreneurs in this district. After an additional visit to the local art gallery, we headed back to the River Walk for lunch. In the late afternoon, we returned to the University of Texas Culture Center to see the Mexican Trees of Life Exhibit, an unexpected gift of original Mexican Olmec art!

Our day of departure was also the day of the San Antonio marathon! Fortunately, our flight was later in the day, so none of the detours applied to us. We were able to enjoy watching the runners pass by, as we walked back to "La Villita" to purchase some last minute souvenirs and gifts.

San Antonio is so much richer in history, architecture, and culture than I even imagined. I am extremely grateful to Alpha Alpha State for helping me realize a lifetime dream. Thank you so much for a wonderful trip that I will always remember!

Sunday brought us four more opportunities for work-

shops. I was certainly glad to be using my new (very light weight) carbon-fiber harp, as each of my choices was located in a different building! The conference provided harp taxis (golf carts) and harp sherpas (mostly husbands of participants) to get folks between buildings and up or down stairs, if needed. With my new harp, I was able to get everywhere I needed to go without assistance.

#### [1] Which now reads:

#### **B.** Special Committees

- The State President shall appoint a committee of three members to read the minutes of the executive Board/Convention business sessions within thirty (30) days of the meeting.
- 2. The State President shall appoint an ad hoc Personnel Committee when a new Treasurer, State Editor, or State Webmaster is to be selected.

# [2] Be amended by addition and inserting a new B as follows:

#### **B.** Nominations Committee

- 1. Elected members of the Nominations Committee are expected to serve in the position for which they were elected for 4 years (2 bienniums). If an elected member of the Nominations Committee cannot fulfill this commitment due to personal reasons she must resign her position as soon as possible so replacement may be appointed by the State President to do the work of the committee.
- 2. Any elected member of the Nominations Committee who wishes to run for an elected officer position in The Pennsylvania State Organization of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International must resign her position on the Nominations Committee by July 1<sup>st</sup> of even numbered years.

#### IV. State Committees

#### A. Membership/Expansion Committee

- 1. Expansion in the state is the responsibility of the State Executive Board.
- 2. The State President, State Membership/Expansion Chairman, and the State Treasurer should be in attendance when a new chapter is installed.
- 3. Expenses for the following attending the installation of a new chapter shall be paid by the state:
  - a. State President
  - b. Membership/Expansion Committee Chairman
  - c. State Treasurer
- 4. Applications of candidates for membership to a new chapter shall be screened and voted upon by the sponsor/sponsoring chapter.
- 5. Pennsylvania State DKG shall provide to each newly formed chapter the Official Initiate Register, Certificate of Membership, and the Delta Kappa Gamma scarf as gifts.
- 6. The State Executive Committee shall determine the name of a chapter to be organized within the state.

#### **B.** Nominations Committee

- 1. Elected members of the Nominations Committee are expected to serve in the position for which they were elected for 4 years (2 bienniums). If an elected member of the Nominations Committee cannot fulfill this commitment due to personal reasons she must resign her position as soon as possible so a replacement may be appointed by the State President to do the work of the committee.
- 2. Any elected member of the Nominations Committee who wishes to run for an elected officer position in The Pennsylvania State Organization of the Delta Kappa Gamma

Society International must resign her position on the Nominations Committee by July 1<sup>st</sup> of even numbered years.

#### C. Special Committees

- 1. The State President shall appoint a committee of three members to read the minutes of the executive Board/Convention business sessions within thirty (30) days of the meeting.
- 2. The State President shall appoint an ad hoc Personnel Committee when a new Treasurer, State Editor, or State Webmaster is to be selected.

#### D. Meetings

Committee chairmen shall involve all committee members. A minimum of one meeting per biennium is recommended.

#### E. List of Duties and Inventory

Each state committee chairman shall maintain a list of duties and responsibilities of her office and an inventory of materials and equipment in her use. One copy shall be passed to the chairman succeeding her, and one copy shall be mailed to the State President upon request.

Rationale for change: This addition of language will provide a consistent and written mode of operation when those serving on the nominations committee are unable to complete their term.
