Yet, it doesn't stop there. She has participated in multiple Purposeful Seminars, Arts Retreats, Fall


Conferences, and the Leadership Development Program. She has traveled to five Regional Conferences and four International Conferences.

Membership Chair, read a motion from the Membership Committee recommending with regret that the following Chapters be dissolved – **Iota** Chapter and **Alpha Lambda** Chapter. With this motion being made by a committee, it did not require a second. President Eileen stated that the motion requires a simple majority from those on the Executive Board to pass. An electronic vote then occurred with 35 out of 35 Chapters voting in favor of the motion. The motion **passed**.

Lois Brown, Chi Chapter and Rules Chair, read the first proposal to be considered for this convention concerning the Keystonian. The motion Lois read was to amend Article X (Activities), Section 2 (Publications) that states "The Keystonian shall be made available four (4) times a year to all members. The Keystonian shall be available online and through snail mail" to read: "The Keystonian shall be made available four (4) times a year to all members. The Keystonian shall be available online or by special request." There was an amendment to this proposal and the **final version** reads: "The Keystonian shall be available on-line or, if requested, **by a mail-printed version."** This motion was voted by all members present and it **passed**. President Eileen stated that a process will be developed and shared with the membership as to how each member will choose if they want an electronic or mail printed copy of the *Kevstonian*.

Lois Brown, Chi Chapter and Rules Chair, read the second proposal to be considered for this convention concerning Nominations. The motion Lois read was to amend Article VIII. Section 3D that states "The Nominations Committee shall consist of seven (7) members. The immediate past president shall serve as chairman for a two-year term. The Executive Board shall elect three (3) members each biennium for a fouryear term" to read "The Nominations Committee shall consist of seven (7) members. A past state organization president, appointed by the newly installed state organization president, shall serve as chairman of the Nominations Committee. The Executive Board shall elect three (3) members each biennium for a four-year term." This motion was voted on by all members present and this **motion** failed.

Barbara Gasperini, Alpha Upsilon and Immediate Past State President/Nominations Chair presented the following slate of officers for the 2021 -2023 biennium.

The correct amounts were provided, and the updated budget is on the State website. Mary then made the following motion: "The Finance Committee makes the motion to adopt the 2021-2022 budget for the Pennsylvania State Organization of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society International." Since the motion came from committee it did not require a second. President Eileen called for the electronic vote from the Executive Board and with 33 out of 33 Chapters voting in favor of the budget, the motion passed.

NOTES FROM THE FORUM Susan Fritz Chi Us Forum/Ed. Legislation Chair

On May 19, 2021, Alma Couverthis, National Organizing Director of the League of Women Votes, headlined a one hour *Zoom* presentation on *Voting: A Right for Everyone.* There are links to this excellent presentation and PowerPoint on the DKG US Forum website. I encourage you to review the PowerPoint for information related to recent anti-voter tactics used prior to election, those that occur on election day, restrictive voting bills, and voter bills that protect the rights of voters.

One of the ways I spent my pandemic time was watching webinars and *Zoom* presentations on topics that caught my interest. One of my discoveries was the discussion series, *Talking Climate!*, on Second Fridays at the Climate Museum. Museum Director Miranda Massie serves as the moderator of a panel of three to five people who are academic researchers and/or are running programs focused on addressing a specific aspect of climate. Indigenous poets and artists

are featured as well. Each session ends with "an ask" that provides specific actions one can take to use the information presented. Among the sessions I watched are *Climate Arts in the Pandemic, Identity, Infrastructure*, and *Food*. The June session is *Law*, which I will miss due to State Convention. Past sessions are accessible at https://climatemuseum.org/second-fridays

Listening to these conversations has broadened my idea of climate and its multi-layered effects on our lives. Intersectionality, a new word for me, is frequently used to describe how multiple systems come together in a synergistic fashion for either positive or negative effect. Whether your interest is scientific, artistic, sociological, or all of the above, I invite you to view one of these sessions or visit the Climate Museum online or in New York City.

Having served as US Forum/Educational Legislation Chair US for the past six years it seems the time is right to pass the torch. Many thanks to Pennsylvania State Organization Presidents Tracy Dusch, Barbara Gasperini, and Eileen Little for extending the opportunity to serve in this position and the very best wishes to the new Chair.

More Convention Coverage: Two Perspectives

#1 Chapter Presidents Finally Meet Face-to-Face Training Amy Dobbins, Beta Epsilon



A feeling of high energy was in the air in the electric city of Scranton on June 11, 2021, as the cur-

rent DKG Chapter Presidents gathered for the first time face to face for chapter president leadership training. After meeting remotely for the past year through *Zoom*, the presidents were excited to finally meet each other in person and experience genuine spiritual fellowship. New friendships were forged and acquaintances were renewed. Everyone looked forward to a day of training presented by Connie Rensick, International Member at Large, and the state leadership committee.

Connie Rensick facilitated the morning training session, which focused on communication styles and generational differences.



As part of the workshop, the presidents completed a communication inventory assessment which revealed their personal communication style. An opportunity was given to collaborate with other presidents with similar communication results. As part of their work, each group created a song title and line to a song that summed up their communication style. This was a creative and fun

way to explain the characteristics of their group. Finally, the four communication styles were discussed and suggestions were given on how to effectively engage people with their specific communication style.

The second part of the session concentrated on generational differences. The presidents were grouped according to their specific generation such as baby boomers and generations x and y. Each generation discussed their communication preferences such as letter writing, email, texting, social media, etc. Results were shared within the large group and ways to engage each generation were discussed. As the session concluded, I reflected upon what I learned about our differences, but discovered, despite those differences, we all were similar in our desire to be forward moving ever in our chapters and promote the mission and purposes of the Society.

After partaking in a boxed lunch and socializing with our fellow presidents, we were eager for the afternoon session facilitated by Dr. Lyn Schmid and the state leadership committee. The session began with a mock electronic vote. This was done in final preparation for PA State's inaugural electronic vote slated for the first general session at the convention. Leadership committee members and Sue Allen, state webmaster were on hand to troubleshoot any technical problems.

After a successful round of mock voting, Dr. Lyn Schmid, leadership chair, presented "Living a Legacy of Leadership." One

particular item that resonated in me was that the members of the chapter call for the chapter it wants. The president doesn't call for the chapter. Often, leaders believe that they need to promote their particular initiatives and lose sight of what their chapter members truly want and feel. Members are the heart of DKG, and the chapter needs to fit to the needs of the membership.

Another key topic presented was a sharing of ideas on how the chapters kept connected during Covid-19 and how to keep members involved in the chapter. Virtual meetings tended to be the norm during this trying time.

To celebrate the end of the first year of the president's biennium the leadership committee served each president a glass of sparkling grape juice. A toast was made to



wish each president a successful second year of their presidency. At the end of the session, the chapter presidents decided to continue to meet virtually through the remainder of the biennium to share the workings of our chapters.

James Kim says "It is encouraging to see that we are not alone. We can learn from each other." We all look forward to sharing how we put into practice what was learned at our leadership training to move our chapters forward ever.



Deborah Kern will use her grant to travel with two of her grandchildren to the North Rim of the Grand Canyon in Arizona. Her travels will include other experiences for the children as the "Ark" in Kentucky, Mesa Verde National Park in Colorado, and Zion and Bryce National Parks in Utah. She will create digital memory books for the grandchildren and herself to share the "road trip" experience with others.


Scholarship Recipients





In March, 2021, Sigma Chapter again held its meeting on *Zoom*. Ann Nowaskie presented an


