thus fulfilling Purposes #4 and #7
of the Society.

Lisa Maatz, a nationally recognized leader in the modern women's movement, brought vision and humor to the opening of the seminar by sharing her experiences with advocacy. Relating her own successes of advocating as a

young grade school student, she recounted her efforts to obtain bathroom stall doors. She made us all think of our own successes and experiences of being advocates. How easy it can be to fight for what you believe in!

The beginning discussion of advocacy opened the next 2 days to hot issue discussions on: education opportunities for young girls; suicide and mental health issues in teens; human trafficking and violence against women and girls; health issues affecting women and families; and

women's leadership. This culminated with an update/briefing on legislative issues, which gave attendees information on what to advocate for when boarding buses to the Capitol and visiting representatives and senators on Capital Hill.

Concluding the seminar and giving us the impetus to go home and continue, was Susan Scanlan, a well known speaker and advocate for women's issues and an honorary member of the Pennsylvania State Organization

#### **CTAUN**

#### Susan Fritz, Chi US Forum/Educational Legislation Chair

he 2018 Conference on "Teaching About the United Nations" (CTAUN) was held at the United Nations in New York City on April 6, 2018. 56 people were registered. Previously held in January, CTAUN was moved to the new date to avoid the uncertainties of winter weather in the Northeast and to better coordinate with the schedules of university and high school students.

It is not possible to do justice to the incredible range of information provided through CTAUN. With the theme of "Stepping Up to Protect the World's Children," speakers discussed the conditions within which children of the world are living. The **Seventeen Sustainable Goals,** advanced by the United Nations, were called "The World's Largest Lesson," with four of the goals advancing long-term solutions and all of them having an impact on the health and welfare of children.

Protecting children from violence is a basic human right. A child dies from violence every five minutes and half the world's children suffer violence every year. Children are the main victims of armed conflicts as hospitals and schools are closed, destroyed, or used for military purposes. The Committee on Violence Against Children has three goals:

- ~ A clear agenda for violence prevention
- ~ Adoption of strong pieces of legislation ~ Gathering the best possible data

We also need to recognize that a *culture of peace* starts with each one of us making a commitment to living in a peaceful manner and making changes in our daily life, so that we are modeling and teaching the behavior we want to see.

The afternoon sessions focused on solutions. Mark Barden, Managing Director of Sandy Hook Promise, lost his 5-year-old son, Daniel, to the violence of a school shooting. He reinforced that violence almost always is preventable. The foundation has a Safety Assessment and Intervention Program for schools as well as three other programs that are provided free of charge. The day concluded with a presentation from "Girls Be Heard," a performance group that tells the stories and realities of young women.

Many of us are fortunate to live free of violence or even the threat of violence. This is not the reality for much of the world and nearly half of all children. We know this to be true. Is there a step you can take to make the world safer for children?

# Historical Records: Consolidating Materials in the Digital Age

n my DKG chapter, many of us used to cringe when asked to be the chair of the Historical Records committee. It was not because of the work involved, but because of the carload of containers of aged scrapbooks and materials that one needs to house every biennium. The scrapbooks have become fragile to the point of disintegration, which posed yet another problem for the chapter – how to maintain our history as it disappeared before our eyes. The answer was discussed at length by the chapter's members, and a solution was devised. Using a digital camera, every relevant page of our scrapbooks was photographed and committed to a thumb drive so that they could be accessed easily via computer. Once all the nearly twenty seriously deteriorated and dilapidated scrapbooks were photographed and stored on a thumb drive to the satisfaction of the group, the scrapbooks were brought to chapter meetings for an entire year. Sisters were encouraged to take a last look at the scrapbooks, then asked if they wanted to personally take any of these scrapbooks for their own collections. If no one personally wanted the deteriorating scrapbooks, because of their state of unsustainability, they were respectfully retired.

The thumb drive of our scrapbooks is available to be viewed at any time. Our Corresponding Secretary currently houses the thumb drive for safe-keeping, but this can easily be copied and given to the chair of Historical Records. In the future, we plan to turn the digital photographs into a power point presentation or some equally user-friendly mode for the sisters to share, especially during our birthday celebrations every May. In this way, our history is maintained in a modern mode and our chair of the Historical Records committee can have a much more portable and accessible file. We have



# Past State President Carol Ulrich: tribute given by Barb Tobias, Nu "Celebration of Life" Sunday, June 17th, at the Nittany Lion Inn.

ne of our Past State Presidents, Carol Lynn Ulrich, passed away on February 12, 2018, at the age of 71. Carol was dedicated to her career, church, family, community, and Delta Kappa Gamma. She spent her entire career in the Eastern Lebanon County School District, 22 ½ years in teaching and 16 ½ as the principal of the Myerstown and Jackson Elementary Schools. She started the musicals at Schafferstown Elementary School and did thirteen of them during

her career. Every student had a part in the show and could enjoy the learning experience of how to put on this type of program, and the rewarding feeling of offering their talents and working together.

As an administrator, she realized that there were four different elementary schools which converged at the middle school causing much anxiety in many of the fifth graders. She decided to try a fifth grade overnight camping trip. All the fifth graders were introduced to each other and enjoyed many different activities, including living, working and

playing together. This reduced the scariness of entering the middle school. The new endeavor was so successful that it continues.

But Carol's dedication did not end with her career. After her retirement in 2007, she served on the Eastern Lebanon County School Board and Foundation, was a member of Historic Schaefferstown, and very active in her church there—being the first woman on Congregation Council.

As for Delta Kappa Gamma, Carol was initi-

ated into Nu Chapter of Lebanon County in 1974. She chaired a variety of Nu Chapter committees and held all offices going up the executive ladder and finally as Chapter President in 1984-86. Carol was awarded "The Golden Gift Fund" which paid for her to go to Austin, Texas, and take Leadership Training Classes in 1990. Carol was the first State President to preside at the Nittany Lion Inn in 2004, and we have been here ever since.

A special interest for her at the state level was to change part of the format at the convention. The business meeting was lasting all Saturday morning, and she felt it was too long so she cut it short and offered another workshop for the participants, which gave a large variety of topics for our members to enjoy.

We are so grateful to Carol for the leadership and inspiration she has given to her Delta Kappa Gamma sisters!

## **Enrichment Excursions**

#### Southern Caribbean's ABC Islands Bonnie Lee Barnes, Alpha Sigma

've never been on a cruise ship before and my first experience was a "bucket list" enrichment experience. It was the middle of winter in western PA when I boarded the Crown Princess on Febru-



ary 23rd, in sunny Fort Lauderdale, Florida, bound for the ABC Islands of the southern Caribbean. The 8-day cruise

would sail to Aruba, Bonaire, and Curacao, and cover 2,561 miles of ocean.

My first two days at sea were picture perfect; warm ocean breezes and sunny skies dotted with puffy white clouds. I explored every nook and cranny of the huge ship, found all the pools, elevators, restaurants, and my lifeboat location, should the need arise. There were onboard shops for shopping but I preferred walking the decks, inside and out, watching the sea water roll by at approximately 19 miles an hour. Thankfully, I was blessed with "sea legs" and never experienced any sea-sickness.

The first port of call was the capital city of Willemstad, Curacao, a UNESCO World Heritage Site. On a private 4 hour tour, I explored the entire island, stopping at Christoffel National Park, 4,500



acres of protected land and conservation area, where breathtaking views of the seaside landscapes nestled beside desert terrain.

Another stop was the Hato Caves, more than 300,000 years old and the biggest cave on the island. Instead of going down, this cave was situated high above the island, taking many steps up to reach the cave opening. It was one of the many historic hiding places for escaped slaves of past culture. The tour ended at the Queen Emma Pontoon Bridge that connects the two sides of Willemstad, Punda and Otrobanda. Built in 1888, the bridge swings like a

pendulum to permit ships to enter and exit St. Anna Bay. I walked across and back but could not figure out how the bridge operated.

Oranjestad, Aruba, was the next island on the journey. My advice for first timers is to book the Kukoo Kunuku California Lighthouse and Beach

tour. An open air, repurposed school bus takes you on a tour of the island. Beginning with the Alta Vista Chapel, built in the cununcu (countryside), you'll pass local houses painted



every imaginable color of the rainbow. Located along the road/walkway leading up to the Chapel are the Stations of the Cross. Services are still held every Sunday, overlooking the Sea. From here we drove to the California Lighthouse which offered a panoramic view of the island - water all around. Our last stop was a chance to swim in the ocean and soak up the sun on one of the many pristine white sandy beaches.

The last island, located north of Venezuela, was Bonaire. Docking at Kralendijk, I began the day

with a 9 AM snorkeling adventure on a catamaran. I was able to explore two different reef sites and swim with fish that used to live in our salt water fish tank of long ago.



Before I planned this trip, I had three things I wanted to do while at sea: witness the sunrise, enjoy the sunset, and see the night sky with all its stars. I managed the firsts two almost every day but the night sky was not as expected because of the presence of a full moon and some cloud cover. But even that was an impressive experience at sea.

My Enrichment Grant from DKG was everything I expected and I thank you, my DKG Sisters, for providing this opportunity to apply for and be awarded this monetary grant to board a cruise ship and visit new places.


