large part of the history of women in American education through most of the twentieth century was one of struggling to achieve training and working conditions on a par with men. A major advance in this struggle was made on May 11, 1929, when Dr. Annie Webb Blanton and eleven other women educators met in Austin, Texas, and founded Kappa Gamma Delta, the forerunner of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International.

The Society was destined to become the largest of its kind in the world, but could not have grown so successfully without the dedicated involvement of many other women throughout the country. In Pennsylvania, Florence Abplanalp McGinty became a strong force for the advancement of Delta Kappa Gamma and its ideals. Florence, today at age 104, is the oldest of the Psi Chapter (her local chapter), Alpha Alpha (The Pennsylvania chapter), and The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. In addition, Florence is the oldest living chapter founder and the oldest living past president of a local chapter.


Florence was a student at The Pennsylvania State University (Penn State) in State College, Pennsylvania, when she was approached by Blanche Foster, a past state president of Alpha Alpha, and invited to join the organization. Florence accepted the invitation, but there was not a chapter in northwestern Pennsylvania for her to join. It was expected that Florence would start one. Undeterred by the challenges of beginning an entirely new chapter, Florence did the necessary organizing. She was instructed to contact superintendents of area schools, requesting the names of the best female educators in their districts. As a Delta Kappa Gamma member we have one mission statement with seven overriding purposes. There are 133,000 members among 3000 chapters. We are in fourteen member countries and there are seventy-seven state organizations. We have been founded by twelve outstanding women educators the fifth month, the eleventh day in the year 1929. International has invited all of us to apply for a 75th Diamond Jubilee grant. They have also encouraged members to present Jubilee Moments at the Minneapolis convention which is to be held July 27 to 31, 2004.

What a great opportunity to showcase the talents of your members! Information about these opportunities is available from your chapter president or from the International website.

Your state convention committee is also planning similar Jubilee activities to happen at state convention, June 11, 12, 13, 2004, at the NITTANY LION INN, State College.

Now back to our numbers. Wouldn't it be fantastic if all sixty-three chapters attended the state convention in June? It would also be exhilarating for your state officers to send in their biennial reports with input from all sixty-three chapters. (Forms will be out in December and due by February 1, 2004.) We can do this with everyone's cooperation. What an opportunity you have to add to the legacy of Delta Kappa Gamma and Alpha Alpha State. The "sparkle from the past to the brilliance of the future" will be firmly addressed by all Alpha Alpha State members. Sprinkle the diamond dust in your chapters and join in the 75th Diamond Jubilee festivities. What better way to make our mission statement real: To promote professional and personal growth of women educators and excellence in education.

MEMBERSHIP

3 R's for Delta Kappa Gamma Members

The local chapter's year is well on its way--- new members have been initiated, committees are working, dues have been paid and interesting programs have been planned. But, I urge you not to just sit back. Use these next few months for the 3 R's of Membership: Reorientation, Recommitment, and Reinstatement.

- #1. Reorientation: Any time, at any meeting is the time for reorientation. All members, no matter what the date of initiation, need to hear about the heritage of our Society. Members need to be reminded of the responsibilities of membership. Have your chapter members sing the Delta Kappa Gamma Song at each meeting. Recite the purposes and the mission statement. Have the chairmen of the Standing Committees report on the purpose and activity of each committee. Take time for the members, themselves. Plan to highlight or profile a new member and a veteran member at each meeting.
- #2. **Recommitment**: Begin a chapter meeting with a Recommitment Ceremony. The Chapter Membership Committee can prepare one or use the following, taken from Ceremonies (1994), p. 33.

Leader: I am proud of my membership in The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International, and am proud to rededicate myself to the Purposes of the Society.

Members: I am committed to this goal.

Leader: I believe our Society can assume even greater leadership in the improvement of education and the advancement of women educators.

Members: I am committed to this goal. Leader: I believe that through expanding membership, personal relationships and service, we can contribute greatly to world peace and understanding. Members: I am committed to this goal.

Leader: I believe that our members can contribute significantly to the quality of life of those we touch.

Members: I am dedicated and committed to this goal.

- #3. Reinstatement: Your chapter membership could increase by reexamining the former membership rolls. Perhaps the reason for a former member having dropped out no longer exists. Reach out to these quality educators and fine women and invite them to return to active membership in The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International. Let former members know that they have been missed. Former chapter members can now rejoin the Society easily. The process for reinstatement involves the following:
 - a)The former member requests reinstatement in the chapter. The chapter may or may not be the chapter of original membership.
 - b)The chapter then votes on the reinstatement.c)With a majority vote, the former member is restored to membership.

Because of changes in the Constitution by the International Convention at Little Rock, Arkansas, in 2002, the reinstatement fee no longer exists. When reinstatement occurs between July 1 and April 1, the reinstated member pays the usual dues and scholarship fee. If the reinstatement occurs outside these dates, the reinstated member will pay dues and fees at the same time as the others in the chapter.

founding in 1948 the Psi Chapter. At the age of 49, she became the first president of Psi and served three years.

Florence's involvement in education had been a long-term commitment by the time she started the Psi Chapter. She graduated in 1920 from Ridgway, Pennsylvania schools, the daughter of Swiss immigrants. She then graduated from West Chester Normal School in 1921, and continued her post graduate studies for the next seven summers, one at West Chester, one at Indiana Normal School, and five at Penn State to receive her advance degree.

Florence pursued her teaching career in her home town of Ridgway as a third grade teacher in the Central School of Ridgway's school district. She was eventually named elementary school principal, the first such appointment in the Ridgway district, a position she held for fifteen years before retiring.

Florence's commitment to her community paralleled her dedication to her teaching and her professional activity. She was a member of the ladies' auxiliary of the Ridgway Hospital and a long-time member of the Village Improvement Association. As with Delta Kappa Gamma, she was a charter member of the Golden

Who is the Best Source for Chapter Programs? YOU ARE!

re you doing something great in your school about which chapter members might be interested in hearing? Are you a member of a community group that has a goal to support women's issues? Have you been doing research in a field of study that is exciting to you? All of these examples are terrific opportunities to provide your chapter with a viable, authentic program.

However, do your knees feel like rubber when you have to get up and speak in front of a group? Do you feel like the next words out of your mouth are going to be the dumbest words ever uttered by a human? If you answered, "yes!" to either of these last two questions, you are perfectly normal, and you are not alone.

According to the *Book of Lists*, the fear of speaking in public is the #1 fear of all fears. The fear of dying is only #7! My encouragement to you is that there is no better place to overcome this stage fright than with your chapter sisters who want you to succeed.

I have always believed that one of the greatest gifts that our Society gives us is the opportunity to learn new skills. Running a proper parliamentary meeting, developing a financial statement, and learning how to get involved in an organization on local, state, and international levels are just a few of the things that come to mind that $\Delta K\Gamma$ has taught me.

ONE OF THE GREATEST GIFTS OUR SOCIETY GIVES US IS THE OPPORTUNITY TO LEARN NEW SKILLS

By presenting a program to your chapter, you will be contributing a valuable service, and you will be gaining considerable experience that will serve to fulfill Purpose #6 – To stimulate the personal and professional growth of members. Nothing will relax you more than to know

you are properly prepared. Here are a few suggestions you can use to overcome your speaking anxiety:

- 1. Know Your Material. Choose something that you easily could have a conversation about with a colleague. Authentic data that you have collected or experiences that you have had are great items to present. Practice your speech or presentation and revise it until you can present it with ease.
- 2. Visualize Yourself Speaking. Imagine yourself walking confidently to the lectern as the audience applauds. Imagine yourself speaking, your voice loud, clear and assured. When you visualize yourself as successful, you will be successful.
- 3. Don't Apologize for Being Nervous. Most of the time your nervousness does not show at all. If you mention it or apologize for any problems you think you may have with your speech, you will only be calling attention to it.
- Concentrate on Your Message Not the Medium. Your nervous feelings will dissipate if you focus your attention away from your anxiety and concentrate on your message and your audience, not yourself.
- 5. Realize People Want You to Succeed. All audiences want speakers to be interesting, stimulating, informative, and entertaining. Your ΔΚΓ sisters especially want you to succeed and will give you positive feedback.

Experience builds confidence, which is the key to effective presentations. If you launch out and present an informative program to your chapter, you will find that your anxieties will decrease and you will be ready to start speaking in other arenas. Personal Growth and Services

In the last issue of the Keystonian this article included a general overview of the work and responsibilities of the committee.

Now let us direct our attention to one of the Society's purposes to which this committee is concerned:

To stimulate the personal and professional growth of members and to encourage their participation in appropriate programs of action

This article will further zero in on your personal growth and encourage you to consider "Changing the World One Day at a Time."

A change of hair color is just a salon away, a change of scenery is as close as your travel agent, and a change of address is available to you in the real estate section of the newspaper. But how do you change the little things that make up the woof and warp of your daily life? You can change your world, one day and one decision at a time. You'll be amazed at the dramatic difference in the quality of life these small suggested daily decisions can facilitate. Try them-they do work!

* Schedule a manicure, pedicure and facial. Plan for it, budget for it-or just do it. You can face almost anything with "drop dead red" toenails, even if they're hidden in sensible working shoes.

* Forgive one person for one action. Set the grudge down and pick up the phone or a pen. It doesn't have to be an emotional earthquake-just a release of the event or action. Choose not to let it affect today, and it won't affect tomorrow.

* Write a letter to your parents or someone who contributed greatly to your life. Tell them now what they mean to you.

* Learn something new-a language, computers, a craft-anything that will expand your mind. * For one day, remove criticism from your agenda. If you inadvertently criticize or must criticize (professionally), put the four-to-one rule in effect. For every negative voiced, four compliments must follow to the same recipient!

* Use the four-to-one rule on yourself. For every self-doubt or criticism, tell yourself four characteristics about yourself that are good, special, wonderful, or different.

* Read one book or see one movie with absolutely no redeeming literary or social value.

Small daily decisions can facilitate dramatic differences in quality of life

* For one month (or week if it's all you can manage) change your spending habits. If you always indulge in impulse spending and frivolous purchases, make carefully considered buying decisions. If you overdo the plastic, put those little temptations away and pay cash. If you never treat yourself to something special, say "yes" to the next affordable thing that captures your heart or imagination.

* Smile at people who invite it the least-they usually need it the most.

* Set one goal a day. Lots of quick attainable ones and some "biggies" that will take a little longer and will require some stretching to reach.

* At the end of every day-or at the start of each new day-list the previous day's "wins"-all the things that went right or you did well. You really are terrific!

* Look in the mirror. Really look in the mirror. Make friends with not only what you see, but who you see. Ahh...what a difference a day can make.

ALPHA ALPHA STATE BEGINS A NEW BIENNIUM

Alpha Alpha State Officers met for the first time this biennium on Friday evening, August 15, 2003. President Carol Ulrich began the meeting with a thought about the anatomical makeup of a simple bumblebee, i.e., it is not built for flying, yet is able to take wing and accomplish an almost impossible feat. She reminded us that that which seems impossible can be accomplished and so introduced her theme for the first year of her biennium, "Opportunities." President Carol outlined the following goals for her biennium:

Communication; not only between the state organization and chapters, but between the chapters and their members

Reporting Procedures; the importance of all members to adhere to deadlines for reports and notices

State History; the formation of a committee to write a history of Alpha Alpha State

Act 48; continued investigation into Alpha Alpha State obtaining provider status

Pennsylvania Representation; an increase in representation at state convention, regionals, and International convention, particularly at the International in Minneapolis, MN, as Delta Kappa Gamma celebrates its 75th anniversary

Membership; continued work on maintaining and increasing membership

Following a discussion related to each of her goals, President Carol briefly spoke of the Northeast Regional recently held at the Greenbrier and recognized Alpha Alpha State's first vice president, Dr. Lyn Schmid, for outstanding presentations at the regional. Lyn conducted 2 different workshops, "World Fellowships for Global Understanding" and "How Cross-Generationally Friendly is Your Chapter?", that were superb and well attended. We were

reminded of the 'Opportunities' that we all have of presenting at regionals and International and that these 'Opportunities' need to be promoted as well among our members.

The future of the Scholarship Shop was also a topic of discussion. The Scholarship Shop is a service to our members and one area that our members look forward to visiting during state convention. The finances of the committee to maintain this service and the different items available to be sold in the future, as well as how this service can continue to be of benefit to our members on the state level, will be addressed by a subcommittee appointed by President Carol.

Other items of discussion included a Creative Arts
Retreat with start up money from the Visionary Fund, the
State Brochure, the new International Brochure, ideas to
encourage attendance in Minneapolis at the 2004
International Convention next July, and the new
International project - "Teacher Training in Afghanistan."
Again, the theme 'Opportunities' was stressed as we prepare for the beginning of this new biennium.

Bringing the last state convention to a close was a report of evaluations given by past parliamentarian, Suzanne Long. This was followed by ideas from President Carol as to how she envisions incorporating workshops, leadership training, raffles, the Album of Distinction, World Fellowship recipients and fellowship into the 2004 state convention.

As President Carol, her officers, and committee chairs work to provide 'Opportunities' to the members of Alpha Alpha State during this first year of the biennium, it is hoped that individual involvements within the Society and its purposes will lead members to soar into the second year of the biennium, carrying out the theme of "Roots and Wings."

ACTION ALERT

Educators are making a concerted effort nationwide, to repeal Social Security offsets. We are asking members of Congress to SUPPORT passage of H.R.594 and S.349 which would eliminate the GPO and WEP, laws that reduce Social Security benefits of public employees.

WHAT ARE THE GPO AND WEP?

The GPO - Government Pension Offset and WEP - Windfall Elimination Provision are laws that have an impact on public employees who receive a public pension in those states that chose NOT to have their employees pay into the Social Security system.

GPO reduces the Social Security SPOUSAL BENEFIT an affected public employee can receive. A teacher who spent time in public service is eligible only for a small percentage of a deceased spouse's paid Social Security. Nine out of ten public employees lose ALL of their spousal benefit.

WEP reduces an INDIVIDUAL'S OWN Social Security benefits earned while working in a job covered by Social Security.

An example: a teacher who seeks other employment in the summer is NOT ALLOWED to get the full Social Security benefit that they PAID into the system.

The impact of these offsets is felt in the states where public employees (teachers) are NOT covered by Social Security.

This includes Alaska, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Georgia, Illinois, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maine, Massachusetts, Missouri, Nevada, Ohio, Rhode Island and Texas.

SOCIAL SECURITY FAIRNESS ACT of 2003

The McKeon-Berman Social Security Fairness Act (H.R. 594) to repeal GPO and WEP was filed on 2/5/03. This legislation was sponsored by Rep. Buck McKeon (R-CA) and Rep. Howard Berman (D-CA), during the last Congress. It was then referred to the House Committee on Ways and Means. Reps McKeon and Berman said, "It is simply unacceptable to ask Americans to perform the most vital services in our nation and reduce their retirement benefits in the process."

WHAT ACTION CAN YOU TAKE:

THANK the SPONSORS of the bill and ASK YOUR SENATORS to sign on and SUPPORT the repeal of the GPO/WEP.

Sponsors of the bill: Senators Collins(R-ME), Landrieu (D-LA), Snowe (R-ME), Kennedy (D-MA), Allen (R-VA), Johnson (D-SD), Dayton(D-MN) and Bunning (R-KY). The Companion Bill to H.R. 594 was filed by Sen. Feinstein (D-CA), and is S.349

In closing, I share this quote with you, by Margaret Mead, anthropologist.

"Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has."

HISTORICAL RECORDS

What are historical records? Really, there are no specific guidelines. However, there should be a distinct difference between what represents the chapter's life story and what would be appropriate for the chapter president's personal scrapbook.

A rule of thumb might be to consider if the information or item would be of importance 25 years into the future. To determine the value of the material, focus on the newspaper W's--who, what, where, when and why. Include names, dates, places, photos and other items that relate to an event which would be vital for future reference.

The permanent records of an organization should document the important events of its existence.

STATE COMMITTEE COMMUNICATIONS

Alpha Alpha State Scholarships and Enrichment

Grants are available to members in good standing who have held membership for at least three years.

Scholarships will be offered for graduate study leading to an advanced degree or certification, or toward job/self improvement. Credit may be earned during a regular or summer term at an accredited college/ university.

A scholarship recipient may apply more than one time, but an individual's total may not exceed the maximum of \$3,500.

Enrichment Grants will be awarded for enrollment in an Elderhostel program, continuing education for personal and professional growth, a travel/study tour, or to develop an approved independent study project or to present a paper to a professional organization.

An Enrichment Grant recipient may receive a onetime award in each of the following categories:

- 1. Elderhostel or continuing education
- 2. Travel/study
- Individual project, research project, or presentation of a paper.

An applicant may not receive more than \$2,500 from Enrichment Grant monies. The following "Alpha Alpha State Scholarship Award Point System" will be used as criteria for selection:

ACHIEVEMENT AWARD GUIDELINES (Revised 1998) I. Purpose

The purpose of the Alpha Alpha State (Pennsylvania)
Achievement Award is to recognize and honor a member who
has given distinguished and outstanding service to Alpha Alpha
State and has promoted the purposes and the policies of the
Delta Kappa Gamma Society International.

II. Criteria for Selection

- A. The nominee must be presently an active member of Alpha Alpha State. (Reserve and honorary members are not eligible for this award.)
- B. The nominee must have a minimum of ten years' membership in Alpha Alpha State of The Delta Kappa Gamma Society International.

C. The nominee must have served in a leadership role in her chapter as president or vice-president and contributed to the work of chapter committees.

D. The nominee must have given distinguished and outstanding service to Alpha Alpha State in two of the following leadership roles:

- As a consultant or a leader in the conducting of seminars and/or workshops at the state and /or international level;
- As general chairman or co-chairman of an activity at a state convention, regional conference, and/or international convention;
- As a state, regional, and/or international committee chairman and/or state officer.
- E. The nominee must have been endorsed by either her chapter's executive board or another chapter's executive board with the prior approval of the executive board of the nominee's chapter.
- F. Each chapter has the privilege of nominating one member of Alpha Alpha State for this honor. It should be emphasized that the award is given for leadership, not merely the discharge of duties.
- G. Chapters have the privilege and are encouraged to resubmit names of previous nominees who have not been selected. The State Achievement Award Committee maintains all nominations for five(5) years. Any chapter wishing to resubmit a name for nomination must complete the add-on nomination sheet in order for that nominee to be considered for the award for another year.
 - H. No member may receive the award a second time.
- I. No state officer shall be eligible for the award during her term of office.
 - J. The award is presented on an annual basis.
- K. The nominee's chapter membership and research committee chairman may be contacted for information to be used in preparation of the nomination form.





Yes, we went West, but we returned to the East, better Delta Kappa Gamma Society members!








